ENGINEER CLARK KILLED.

Engineer Wm. Clark was killed in a wreck near Durham this morning, and three other men were lost, though how badly is not known here yet. The wrecking train left for the scene of the accident at eleven o'clock, and Dr. McDonald went with it to attend to the injured men.

Train No. 4 left Kalispell this morning at 8:30, nearly nine hours late. From the summit down the east slope of the range the "helper" was taken on to assist in getting the train through the snow, which has been drifting badly east of the mountain. Near Durham the engine left the track, dragging off also the baggage car and the tourist sleeper. The remainder of the train kept the track. Engineer Clark was caught under the tender, and crushed to death. Engineer Nelson of the helper and the two women were hurt. It is reported quite seriously, but just how badly is not known here. The accident is supposed to have been caused by a broken rail or the dropping of the pilot.

William Clark the dead engineer was one of the most popular men on the division, not only with the railroad men, but with every one who knew him. No man had more fully the esteem and confidence of the people of the community, and his death comes to them with the feeling of a personal loss. He leaves a wife and two children.

Mr. Edwards moved to this country nearly two years ago from Illinois, hoping that the change would benefit Mrs. Edwards, who was suffering from consumption, but the change came too late to make her recovery possible.

Killed by a Train.

James Elmer was killed by a train at the Stillwater bridge, a mile and a half from town, Friday night or Saturday morning.

The engineer of an incoming freight Saturday morning discovered the body lying by the track and stopped his train. Two of the brakemen went to the body and found that it was cold. The train came in and the conductor reported the finding of the body. A little later the passenger train came in, and engineer Therres also stopped, and a man was left to watch until the coroner could be notified. Coroner McMahon brought in the body and held an inquest Saturday afternoon.

At the inquest it was found that Elmer had been in Kalispell most of the day Friday, and in the evening started with Robert Monaghan to return to his home, near Richards' saw mill. He had been drinking some, and wanted to lie down on the track. Mr. Monaghan took him off several times, and finally left him some distance from the track. Nothing more was seen of him until his body was discovered the next morning. From the position of the body he had evidently been struck by an east bound train during the night. After hearing the evidence the coroner's jury, consisting of A. A. Schonfeldt, Jacob Billings, O. K. Morton, G. W. Farmer, J. H. Hand and C. I. Brown, returned the following verdict, (omitting the formal part.)

"We find that the said James Elmer came to his death by being run over by a train on the Great Northern R. R. on the evening of August 21st, 1897, and that said deceased met his death by his own negligence."

The body was taken charge of by Nat Lyons Post, G. A. R., and the funeral occurred Sunday.

Elmer was 62 years old, and was born in New York. He enlisted in March 1862 in Company C, 17th Iowa cavalry. He had no relatives in this country, the only relative known of being his sister Mrs. Abbie Thayer, of Lakewood, N. Y.

Fehlberg: Mrs. Amelia Fehlberg, wife of William Fehlberg, the well known east side farmer, died Tuesday evening at the age of 62. Funeral services will be held today at the residence, and the burial will take place at the Fairview cemetery. Mrs. Fehlberg has been in poor health for the past two years, and went to Chicago to have a surgical operation for the removal of a tumor performed, but the operation was not successful.

Furey Jas

Jas. Furey, who has been at the county hospital for about a year died Saturday night. He was an old railroad man, and C. H. Mallory, section foreman at LaSalle, and Pat Sellman of Kalispell, took up a subscription to defray the expenses of his funeral, not wishing to have him buried by the county. They themselves made up the deficiency left after making their collections, and have a receipt from undertaker McMahon for the funeral expenses. They wish to thank the people of Kalispell who contributed toward the funeral expenses.

Gillian Alex

Killing at Sylvania.

Alex Gillian was shot and killed by James Gibson at Sylvania Monday last. Not much information has yet been received here in regard to the matter. Sheriff Hubbard, county attorney Long and coroner McMahon went to Sylvania to look into the matter the following day.

From what has been learned here it seems that Gillian has been causing some trouble for the past two weeks. Ten days previous to the killing he shot at Gibson but missed him and shot a hole in the leg of a man called "Lucky Jim," the name being a misnomer in this case. The evening of the killing Gillian went in the saloon where Gibson was and fired three shots at him but they all missed. Gibson then pulled his gun and fired three shots, and they all took effect. Gillian was killed.

Coroner McMahon held an inquest on the body of Gillian after his arrival, and as the jury brought in a verdict of self-defense, Gibson was released from custody.

The officers are expected home this evening.

Martin Hannan, whose family resided on the Whitefish north of Kalispell, died at Great Falls on Sunday afternoon. The body was brought to Kalispell this morning and was taken to the Catholic cemetery near Columbia Falls.

Mr. Hannan came with his family to the valley seven years ago, but for the past three years he has been foreman in a smelter at Great Falls. His health has not been very good, and a short time ago an operation to remove a tumor like growth from his head was performed by the surgeons. It was hoped that its removal would restore him to health, but he slowly failed.

The deceased leaves a widow, three sons and two daughters, all residents of the valley.

Ben Reed's Death.
The Spokesman-Review contains the following in regard to the death of Ben Reed:—
Ben Reed, known by hundreds of people in Spokane, was killed last Wednesday in a mine near Priest lake. The news was brought to Spokane yesterday by W. A. Helm, who is now conducting a store at Priest Lake.
Ben Reed and a man named Wheatley were at work on a claim in the Priest lake district, Idaho. They were in about 13 feet, and put in two blasts. One of the shots went off on time. The miners waited. It is the old story. Thousands of miners have perished in the same way.
Mr. Reed took a brand of fire and went into the tunnel. Just as he got to the fuse to light it the blast went off and killed him.
Mr. Reed has three sons. One is with Mr. McKenzie at East river. The other two came to the scene of the terrible accident, but they could not take the body out, they dug a hole in the snow and laid their father away to rest there until they can arrange to get him over the lake.

Drowned In The Blackfoot.
Missoula, Mont., May 18.—James Thomas, a rancher from Stevensville, was drowned in the Blackfoot river yesterday near McNamara's bridge 10 miles above Bouner. The bridge at this point was swept away by high water several days ago. He wanted to cross the stream and said he would swim his horse across. He was warned not to attempt it, on account of the dangerous stream. Against the protest of strangers he undertook it, and when in midstream he and his horse were washed down into eternity. He was under the influence of liquor. He has a wife and family living at Stevensville. The body was not recovered.
