The Bockman family is one of the oldest and most prominent families in this section of the state, and the accidental death of Harry marks the second tragedy that this family has experienced in the past few years. A son, Ferdinand was shot and killed during the spring of 1924 while executing the duties as chief of police at Libby.

VICTIMS OF WHITEFISH RIVER BURIED TODAY

After a long struggle Saturday afternoon to bring life back to the little bodies of Lloyd Stewart and Jack Brennan, Whitefish physicians were compelled to give up.

It is believed the children fell into the river about 1 o'clock, and were not recovered until about 2 o'clock.

The little Stewart boy went to the bottom at the point where he fell in and Irving Warren, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harley Warren, dived down into 8 feet of water to bring him up.

The little Brennan child floated down the river about 200 feet toward the Second street bridge.

The children lived next door to each other and were constant companions. They evidently walked out to the water's edge on the thin ice and the edge of the ice gave way letting them into the water.

Funeral services were held this morning at 10 o'clock at the Presbyterian church in Whitefish by Rev. Kaltenbach and interment was made in the Whitefish cemetery under the direction of Waggener and Campbell.

DOUBLE FUNERAL HELD FOR WHITEFISH BOYS

Whitefish, Feb. 23.—A double funeral was held at the Presbyterian church, Monday morning for Jimmy Stewart who would have been four years old in June and Larry Brennan who would have been three in July.

As the little ones lived next door to each other, and had always been friends and chums they were not separated in death. The little bodies were laid side by side in the same lot in the Whitefish cemetery.

The lovely flowers sent by friends of the two families testified to the affection in which they and the children were held.

Harley Warren, William Stolte, Vincent Dooley, and Carl Ward, Boy Scouts were pallbearers for Jimmy; and Duane Dugan, Gayhart Nichols, Dan Parks and Bruce Iseninger bore the body of little Larry.

The two children were drowned in the Whitefish river on Saturday after they had wandered away from their yard where they had been playing during the warm part of the day.

The accidental death of these little tots is one of the most tragic that has ever occurred in Whitefish. No one saw the children go toward the river, no one witnessed the accident and no one knows just how long they were in the water.

Both families are prominent in church, civic and the social life of Whitefish and the little ones were known and loved by almost everyone in the city.

Rev. Kaltenbach pastor of the Presbyterian church preached a comforting sermon taking his text from Isaiah, 11-6 "A Little Child Shall Lead Them."

Waggener and Campbell were in charge of the funeral.

BRADY FARMER IS VICTIM OF TRACTOR

Conrad, July 9.—A. H. Britten, living two and one-half miles south of Brady on the Great Falls road, was accidentally killed when he was run over by a tractor on his farm. His wife, who was at the house, ran to the tractor, but in falling, he accidentally pulled the reverse on the engine and it backed over his body, killing him instantly.

The engine was pulling two discs and a drag and was mixed in a heap. The engine was still running when Mrs. Britten arrived, but was digging itself into the ground. She hailed a passing auto and word was sent immediately to V. E. Star, coroner, but no inquest was deemed necessary.

Mr. Britten was a well known railroad man, working on the railroad in Butte in the winter, and farming in the summer. He leaves a wife and one son, the latter being in Great Falls when the accident happened.

Britten was formerly an employee of the Great Northern at Whitefish.
