MRS. WANDA CLARK, SICK, DESPAIRING, COMMITS SUICIDE

Because she was "broke, sick and miserable," Mrs. Wanda Clark ended her life with a bullet at hen home, 512 Seventh avenue west, last evening, probably soon after T o'clock.

The first person to discover the tragedy was William Bellefleur,, who went to the house about 8:300 last evening, found a light burning in the front room, and upon investigation found Mrs. Clark dead in an adjoining bedroom, which was darkened. She lay on the bed in a great pool of blood from a bullet wound in her head. Mr. Bellefleur imme-diately notified Coroner Campbell, who called other officials and made un investigation. On a desk they found a note which clearly indicated! suicide and it was also discovered! that she had purchased the revolver and a box of shells at the Kalispell Mercantile company's stored box of ammunition was found with seven shells removed. Six were in the magazine of the gun, a 35 cali-

the magazine of the gun, a 33 caliber automatic, and the empty shell of the one with which she had killed herself was found upon the floor.

On the desk the officers found a note in which she bade her friends; good-bye, saying that she was sick, broke and miserable. She also said she did not wish to get anyone into trouble, as 'I am doing it myself.'

After a careful investigation Coroner Campbell held that an inquest is unnecessary, as it was evidently a clear case of suicide. There is no doubt of the authenticity of the note, as her signature was found on a number of documents about the house, and the handwriting which has a number of peculiar characteristics, exactly the same as that on the note. The handwriting was firm and legible, and did not indicate that the woman was at all against the locar taking her this property. indicate that the woman was at agitated before taking her life.

It is believed that she committed suicide, soon after 7 o'clock. A neighbor called at the house to borrow a newspaper at that hour, and her body was found about \$.30, but no one in the neighborhood heard the shot. It is said that she has frequently made remarks in recent months which indicated that her act has been contemplated for some time.
