SHOOTS TWO AND THEN KILLS SELF

Reno, Jan. 29.—Victor Clairmont, well-known young rancher, and his wife are dead, and Mrs. Clairmont's sister, Hazel Dupois is wounded at the Clairmont ranch home it was reported today.

Clairmont is believed to have shot the two women and then killed himself last night.

Clairmont's six months old baby and his cousin Josephine Raymond, were unharmed.

Sheriff W. H. Needham and Coroner E. C. Ritz, after an investigation, decided that no inquest would be necessary.

The dead man is a son of Alphonse Clairmont, one of the heaviest landholders in the community.

MRS. WANDA CLARK, SICK, DESPAIRING, COMMITS SUICIDE

Because she was "broke, sick and miserable," Mrs. Wanda Clark ended her life with a bullet at her home, 512 Seventh avenue west, last evening, probably soon after 7 o'clock.

The first person to discover the tragedy was William Bellefleur, who went to the house about 8:30 last evening, found a light burning in the front room, and upon investigation found Mrs. Clark dead in an adjoining bedroom, which was darkened. She lay on the bed in a great pool of blood from a bullet wound in her head. Mr. Bellefleur immediately notified Coroner Campbell, who called other officials and made an investigation. On a desk they

found a note which clearly indicated suicide, and it was also discovered that she had purchased the revolver and a box of shells at the Kalispell Mercantile company's store about 5 o'clock last evening. The box of ammunition was found with seven shells removed. Six were in the magazine of the gun, a .38 caliber automatic, and the empty shell of the one with which she had killed herself was found upon the floor.

On the desk the officers found a note in which she bade her friends good-bye, saying that she was sick, broke and miserable. She also said she did not wish to get anyone into trouble, as "I am doing it myself."

After a careful investigation Coroner Campbell held that an inquest is unnecessary, as it was evidently a clear case of suicide. There is no doubt of the authenticity of the note, as her signature was found on a number of documents about the house, and the handwriting, which has a number of peculiar characteristics, exactly the same as that on the note. The handwriting was firm and legible, and did not indicate that the woman was at all agitated before taking her life.

It is believed that she committed suicide soon after 7 o'clock. A neighbor called at the house to borrow a newspaper at that hour, and her body was found about 8:30, but no one in the neighborhood heard the shot. It is said that she has frequently made remarks in recent months which indicated that her act has been contemplated for some time.

Mrs. Clark was 27 years of age. She came here about 10 years ago and for a time operated the Savoy rooming house on Main street. It is said that several months ago she married a man by the name of Olson in Spokane, but soon separated from him and returned to Kalispell.

Besides her sister she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Ashburn of Ten Mile Lake, Virginia.

No funeral arrangements have been made as yet.

Thomas Joseph Cleary, aged 70 years, passed away yesterday morning. Mr. Cleary was a Lower valley rancher, and an old-time resident of the Flathead valley. His death came after a lingering illness.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bridget Cleary; four daughters, Mrs. G. E. Nesbo, of Shelby, Mrs. William Ambrose, of Creston, Mrs. Harold Foot, of Elmo, and Miss Frances Cleary of Kalispell; two brothers, Joseph Cleary of Phoenix, Ariz., William Cleary of Cadillac, Mich., and one sister Mrs. Patrick Cassidy of Alberta, Canada.

Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Friday morning at the Catholic church in Somers. Rev. Father Nolan will officiate with requiem high mass. Interment will be made in Conrad Memorial cemetery, under the direction of Sherman and Son.

ALBERT COWELL DIES AT SOLDIERS' HOME
