

**BOY ACCIDENTALLY
KILLS COMPANION**

Nicholas Detampel of Olney was accidentally killed Saturday afternoon while hunting with Bruce Dele-gard about three miles east of Olney. Bruce is a boy of 13 years of age. The two went hunting to-gether and as they came into a lit-tle meadow they saw a bear. Both opened fire and in some manner the boy's gun, a 303 Savage rifle must have been accidentally discharged as he turned to watch Detampel shoot. The bullet entered the right front of the abdomen and passed out through the left hip.

Mr. Detampel realizing the seri-ousness of his wound sent the boy for help. Bruce ran all the distance to Olney and several hastened to the meadow in a car but found Mr. Detampel had already passed away from loss of blood before they reached the meadow.

Coroner Campbell and Sheriff Ripke investigated the case and the body was brought to the Waggener and Campbell mortuary.

Mr. Detampel was a single man of about 50 years of age and had lived around Olney for the past 15 years. He has relatives at Fond du Lac, Wisconsin and the body will be shipped there for burial.
