**POLSON PIONEER DIES
STANDING BY HIS PLOW**

Propped in a standing posture against the plow with which he had won his livelihood for many years, the body of Nate Hart, 69, pioneer Polson farmer and hardware merchant, was found in a field on his farm near here Monday. Death, it is believed, was caused by a stroke of apoplexy.

The body, leaning over the plow, the team of which had stopped, was found by J. E. Bell, engineer for the Montana Power company, and a crew, which was returning from work at the proposed powersite near here. They passed the figure, standing over the plow near the road, and then noting something peculiar in the figure's attitude, returned to investigate. They rushed him to Polson but medical examination revealed that he had been dead several minutes.

Mr. Hart came here from Alliance, Neb., in 1910 when the Indian reservation near here was opened to homesteaders. For a number of years, he operated a hardware store in Polson, and when a fire wiped out this enterprise, took up a homestead near the city. For the past several years, he actively farmed his land, and was engaged in fall plowing when stricken Monday.

Mr. Hart is survived by his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Charles Henselman of Missoula and Mrs. Zera Gary of Polson, and a son by a previous marriage in Omaha, Nebraska.—Polson Courier.

The whereabouts of his children are unknown.

**BODY OF CIVIL WAR
VETERAN BROUGHT HERE**

The body of Charles Hollinger will be brought to Columbia Falls Wednesday evening on No. 2 from the coast, where death occurred.

Mr. Hollinger was a Civil War veteran and for several years lived at the Soldier's Home, Columbia Falls. Funeral services will be held in the chapel at the home Thursday at 2 p. m., Rev. Herbert Frame officiating, and burial will be made in the home cemetery under the direction of Waggener and Campbell.

DICK HOUERLICK COMMITTS SUICIDE ON TRAIN NO. 1

By shooting himself through the temple with a 38 revolver, Dick Houerlick committed suicide yesterday evening on train number one, somewhere between Belton and Columbia Falls.

The body was not discovered until the train was about a mile west of Whitefish when a brakeman opened the door of the toilet in the car.

Houerlick was dead when discovered, and on the floor was an empty flask and the revolver. The train was stopped and backed into Whitefish and the man was taken off at the depot. The coroner was then called and he immediately went to Whitefish and took charge of the body.

According to what the trainmen told the coroner Hoyerlick had gotten on the train at Cut Bank and had been drinking at the time as he had a hard time catching the train.

At Cut Bank the man had given the porter a telegram to send to a woman in Aberdeen, Washington. This telegram was the only means of finding out the name of the man as he had no marks of identification on him.

The man was dressed in heavy work clothes but according to reports he did not appear to be a working man as his hands were soft and showed no signs of hard work. He appeared to be about 30 years of age.

Nearly \$500 was found in his clothes.

The body was brought to Kalispell by the coroner, who wired to the person to whom the Aberdeen telegram was sent in order to locate relatives, but no word had been heard late this afternoon.

Mrs. Hummer, who had many friends here, has been missed from social circles of the city a number of years, illness having kept her away from Kalispell much of the time.
