KILLS SELF AT
NIMROD FRIDAY

Mat Matson, Great Northern track watchman at Nimrod, ended his own life some time Friday by shooting himself through the heart with a .38 Smith and Weston revolver.

Matson was 40 years of age, unmarried, and had lived near Essex for about eight years. He was paralyzed in the right side, dragging his foot when he walked, and also had only partial use of his left arm.

He had worked his usual shift Thursday from 4 p. m. until midnight but Friday evening did not come to relieve Tom Fontaine, day watchman.

After two hours' wait, Fontaine went to Matson's shack and found it locked on the inside. Unable to rouse anyone, he looked through the window and discovered Matson in bed. Neighbors were called, and expressed the opinion that he must

Coroner Campbell went up early Saturday morning, responding to a call, and upon his arrival the door, which was found to have been nailed on the inside, was pried open. Investigation revealed that Mr. Matson had killed himself with a revolver while in bed.

The gun having slid down next to the wall and out of sight, the situation was at first puzzling to Mr. Campbell. The only window in the building was small and securely built and as it was filled with undisturbed trinkets it was plain no entry or getaway had been made through it. When the gun was found, the conclusion was reached that the case was clearly one of suicide. No inquest will be held.

The body was brought to the Waggoner and Campbell chapel. Funeral arrangements are as yet incomplete.

BODY OF SOLDIER IS FOUND ON SANDBAR OF BITTER ROOT RIVER

Missoula, July 11.—Having drifted up on a sandbar in the middle of the Bitter Root river a short distance the other side of the MacLay bridge, the body of Henry McIntyre, 21 year old soldier, who disappeared while out herding mules Friday morning, was found about 9 o'clock Saturday morning by Matthew Maricich of 638 Blaine street. Young Maricich, with his father and Clyde MacLay, were crossing the bridge and had been discussing the disappearance of the soldier when the boy happened to glance at the sandbar and the shape of a human body was clearly discernable although part of the clothing was washed up over the face. The men immediately notified county officials and Deputy Sheriffs James Corbett and Pat Callahan went to the scene and assisted in the recovery.

There was no water in McIntyre's lungs and it is believed that he had been kicked by his horse while fording the river. The impression of his horse's hoof is plain over the left eye and there were scratches about his face.

Mr. McIntire was an early resident of Kalispell, and is well-known among the older residents of the city. He came here when Kalispell was first started, the family coming in a caboose, as it was before regular train service had been established on the Great Northern. He was engaged in the furniture business here, and removed to Polson with the opening of the Flathead reservation.

The funeral will be held at the residence at Polson at 1:30 tomorrow afternoon, and the body will be brought to Kalispell for interment in Conrad Memorial cemetery. Services will be held at the grave at 6 o'clock, and will be conducted by Rev. George McVey Fisher.
