Funeral services for George Page, pioneer conductor, were held yesterday at Whitefish in the Masonic temple, by Rev. Reuben Dutton of the Methodist Episcopal church. The body was afterwards forwarded by Waggener & Campbell to Rochester, Minnesota. P. S. McClench accompanying it. A Masonic funeral service will be held in Rochester.

Mr. Page was born in New York City in 1868 and came west as a young man. He had worked for the Great Northern out of Whitefish for about 25 years.

Mrs. Page passed away eight years ago, and only a son, nine years of age survives him. The child is at Rochester.

**PARKER FUNERAL TAKES
PLACE HERE TOMORROW**

Funeral services for Henry S. Parker of Creston, who passed away at the farm home Saturday noon, will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock by Rev. George M. Fisher, at the Presbyterian church in Kalispell, and interment will be made in the Conrad Memorial cemetery under the direction of Waggener & Campbell.

Mr. Parker was a veteran of the Civil war and past 80 years of age. He had not been well for over four months.

The funeral of Henry S. Parker was held at the Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon. Rev. George M. Fisher conducted the funeral services, assisted by Rev. B. Scott Bates. Beautiful flowers were massed upon the altar. The Oddfellows lodge conducted the burial service, after which he was laid to rest beside his daughter in the family burial plot. Mr. Parker will be missed by the whole community for he was a man who was always for the betterment of farming conditions, a good neighbor and a true friend. The sympathy of the community is extended to the wife and family in their deep sorrow in the loss of husband and father.

**HARRY PEARSON
LOSES HIS LIFE
IN SNOWSLIDE**

Coroner Campbell had a tragic story to tell today about Harry B. Pearson, trapper reports of whose death in a snowslide near Nimrod (Java) were received here yesterday.

Tracing his tracks up the steep bank of the middle fork of the Flathead river until they suddenly disappeared in a huge slide of snow, revealed the story of his almost successful climb to the top of the 200-foot bank, the sudden descent of the slide and the sweeping of his body to the bottom. Members of a section crew shoveled, through three feet of hard-packed snow before the uncovered his frozen body lying head down hill, snowshoes on his feet and a pack sack on his back.

It was Pearson's dog who first revealed the fact that all was not well with his master. Pearson, though missed since Friday, had been heaved by his neighbors, Arthur Wogman and Ranger Neitzling, to have taken the train to Kalispell. But when they called a second time at his cabin, they found the dog locked in.

Knowing that Pearson would not have left his dog in the house if he had intended to be away long, the men started out Saturday to track Pearson in different directions, the section crew assisting with the hunt. On Sunday they traced him to the snowslide at the foot of the river bank, a quarter of a mile below the railroad bridge.

It was evident, Coroner Campbell said, that the man had been fishing through the ice in the river, and returning had climbed about half way up the bank before he was swept down by the snowslide.

Sheriff Ripke and Mr. Campbell left for Java last night but were unable to get to work until this morning, when with seven men they started out on snowshoes over four feet of snow to raise the body over the river bank. The body was brought to the Waggener & Campbell chapel and efforts are being made to get into communication with relatives.

Pearson had formerly worked with a bridge crew on the Great Northern but this winter had been living in a cabin near Nimrod and trapping.
