WHITEFISH YOUTH DIES AT SAN DIEGO

Whitefish, Nov. 10.—Word has been received of the death of Hollis Stevens, 18, son of Mrs. Clara Stevens of Whitefish. The young man died at the naval hospital, San Diego, November 6, where he has been confined with an attack of rheumatism for several weeks. His illness was not considered serious by his relatives here. It is thought his heart must have become affected. Hollis joined the navy last February and was stationed at San Diego. Mrs. Stevens and her son Jack, were at Webb, Saskatchewan, taking care of their crop on their ranch near that place. They left at once arriving in Whitefish, Wednesday, where they were joined by Mr. and Mrs. Vorn Stevens, and left on No. 3, for Satsop, Wash., where the body of Hollis Stevens will be laid beside that of his brother, Allan who died here four years ago.

J. M. Stevens passed away early yesterday morning at Camas, Montana, after a lingering illness. He was 78 years of age.

VICTIMS OF WHITEFISH RIVER BURIED TODAY

After a long struggle Saturday afternoon to bring life back to the little bodies of Lloyd Stewart and Jack Brennan, Whitefish physicians were compelled to give up.

It is believed the children fell into the river about 1 o'clock, and were not recovered until about 2 o'clock.

The little Stewart boy went to the bottom at the point where he fell in and Irving Warren, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harley Warren, dived down into 8 feet of water to bring him up.

The little Brennan child floated down the river about 200 feet toward the Second street bridge.

The children lived next door to each other and were constant companions. They evidently walked out to the water's edge on the thin ice and the edge of the ice gave way letting them into the water.

Funeral services were held this morning at 10 o'clock at the Presbyterian church in Whitefish by Rev. Kaltenbach and interment was made in the Whitefish cemetery under the direction of Waggoner and Campbell.

DOUBLE FUNERAL HELD FOR WHITEFISH BOYS

Whitefish, Feb. 23.—A double funeral was held at the Presbyterian church, Monday morning for Jimmy Stewart who would have been four years old in June and Larry Brennan who would have been three in July.

As the little ones lived next door to each other, and had always been friends and chums they were not separated in death. The little bodies were laid side by side in the same lot in the Whitefish cemetery.

The lovely flowers sent by friends of the two families testified to the affection in which they and the children were held.

Harley Warren, William Stolte, Vincent Dooley, and Carl Ward, Boy Scouts were pallbearers for Jimmy; and Duane Dugan, Gayhart Nichols, Dan Parks and Bruce Iseninger bore the body of little Larry.

The two children were drowned in the Whitefish river on Saturday after they had wandered away from their yard where they had been playing during the warm part of the day.

The accidental death of these little tots is one of the most tragic that has ever occurred in Whitefish. No one saw the children go toward the river, no one witnessed the accident and no one knows just how long they were in the water.

Both families are prominent in church, civic and the social life of Whitefish and the little ones were known and loved by almost everyone in the city.

Rev. Kaltenbach, pastor of the Presbyterian church preached a comforting sermon taking his text from Isaiah, 11-6 "A Little Child Shall Lead Them."

Waggoner and Campbell were in charge of the funeral.
