WALCHLI KILLED BY FALL AT EVERETT</p> <p>A wire from Everett, Washington, last night stated that Robert Walchli 46, died there at about 7 p. m., just two hours after he had fallen from a pole while working as lineman for a power company. His brother, Hans, left here this morning and will bring the body to Kalispell for burial. Funeral services will probably be held Friday afternoon at the Presbyterian church.</p> <p>Robert Walchli was brought up by his uncle, A. R. Zimmermann, just east of the city, and attended the local high schools. FRIENDS FROM NEAR AND FAR AT WICKES FUNERAL

The funeral services for the late Rev. Thomas A. Wickes at the Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon called together a large assembly of neighbors and friends, several coming from Missoula, Whitefish, and other places. The floral tributes were unusually numerous and beautiful, bearing silent witness to the love and esteem in which the deceased was held.

Six Presbyterian ministers took part in the services, while Rev. Frank B. Hillis, S. S. missionary, and closely associated with Rev. Wickes in various home-mission enterprises, served as one of the pall-bearers.

Mrs. Wilcox of the east lake shore was buried in the Holt cemetery last Friday. She had been ill several weeks.

Synodical executive, having known Rev. Wickes and his work for 30 years, was present and preached the funeral sermon, taking as his text Paul's words in II Timothy 4:7, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." Dr. Maclean applied these words to Rev. Wickes, showing how his had been a courageous life, well-rounded out, completed, finished, and always inspired by a living faith in the living Christ. With great fervor throughout, the speaker paid high tribute to the sterling worth and cheerful, unselfish character of Rev. Wickes.

Rev. G. A. Kaltenbach of Whitefish brought a message of love and esteem from the Synod of Montana, which was in session at Bozeman when the news of Rev. Wickes' death reached there. Rev. B. Scott Bates brought a similar message from the Kallispell Presbytery and told the circumstances of how Rev. Wickes came to tell his wife that he wanted the hymn, "There is a Land of Pure Delight," sung at his funeral. That hymn of joy is expressive of the belief Rev. Wickes held that for the Christian, his dying is being promoted to a larger life and blessedness beyond.

The other hymns were "The Beautiful Gate," and "Crossing the Bar." The Westminster Male Quartet provided the music, assisted by Mrs. W. L. Beaman at the piano.

Rev. G. M. Fisher, another pioneer minister, offered the prayer. Rev. E. H. Adriance read the scripture and Rev. Joseph Gaston conducted the committal service at the grave.

Elder T. H. Bogart of the local church, S. S. Missionary Hillis and four Lakeside friends, G. H. Adams, Joseph Asbridge, William Cowgill, and J. M. Noble served as pall-bearers. Interment was made in the Wickes plot in Conrad Memorial cemetery.

This happened about 5 p. m. and she died several hours later. Before her death Mary said that she thought the fire in the kitchen stove became so hot that it caused a nearby can of gasoline to explode.
