Mr. Walker served during the Civil War as a private in H Co. 4th Regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry and after his discharge from the army they removed to Hitt, Missouri at which place he died. Later Mrs. Walker came to Montana and for the past 29 years has been a resident of Flathead county. On January 5, 1915 she was admitted to the Montana Soldiers Home and has resided there continuously since her admission, and died March 20, 1932, aged 88 years. She is survived by three children, Nancy C. Hartman of Fowler, Kansas; Melissa M. Wilcox of Hannak, Alberta Canada, and one son Oliver O. Walker of Moline, Illinois.

In 1927 he married Mrs. Clara Anderson of Essex, who survives with his two sons, Gordon A. of Spokane and Charles Lee of Minneapolis. He died September 14, 1932, at the age of 57 years.
