### W. W. Kirkpatrick Is Given Promotion In Army Air Corps

Ward W. Kirkpatrick of Kallspell has been elevated to the rank of corporal in the Army Air Corps, it was learned today by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kirkpatrick.

Young Kirkpatrick, who graduated from Flathead County high school with the class of '41 at the age of 16 years, enlisted in the Army air forces at Kallspell on December 27, 1941. He attended the Army Air Corps technical school at Lowry Field, Denver, Colo. He graduated from this school on May 10.

Following his graduation the Flathead youth, with nine other air corps students selected by Army officials, was sent to St. Louis, Missouri, for an eight-week course of intensive training at an advanced Army Air Corps school where he became qualified as Ball Power Turret specialist. After completion of the course, he was transferred to Boise, Idaho, where he acted as instructor on operation and maintenance of the Ball Power Turret. From Boise, he went to Alamogordo Field, New Mexico. He is now located at Biggs Field, El Paso, Texas.

The promotion of Corporal Kirkpatrick in the air corps is a recognition of his qualities of leadership, initiative and ability, the announcement said.

### Fortune Youth on Bomber in Africa

Allied Force Headquarters in North Africa, Dec. 4. — (AP)—American medium bombers with an escort of P-51 fighters blasted the Tunis airdrome Wednesday in the first Allied raid in 44 hours on that field.

The pilots reported at least 12 Axis bombers and transports were destroyed on the ground.

In the land fighting, a headquarters spokesman revealed that American armored units played "a big part in repulsing the German counter-attacks at Tebourba," which was the biggest Nazi counter-thrust of the campaign.

The American planes returned from the raid without encountering any fighter opposition.

One plane was hit by anti-aircraft fire and was unable to close its bomb doors. Lieutenant Basil B. Burnstead of Burnstead, N. D., a copilot, and Sergeant H. Klinko, Jr., of Fortine Montana, spent two hours in a narrow exit walk without parachutes trying to close them.

The pilot, Lieutenant Emmet L. Saley of Dallas, Texas, finally made a safe belly landing with the doors open.
