# Gerald Schnell Tells of Pacific Island Natives

A letter from Gerald Schnell, who is with the armed forces somewhere in the Pacific, gives an interesting sidelight on the ways of the native -He writes:

Ile writes:

If writes:

Vorgot all about the natives and with Hogan's (the censor's) permission I will tell you about them. A load of them just went by on their way to work, about forty of them in truck and all singing at the top of their voices in four part hormony; sounds as if they had rehearsed long and hard but it is all just a part of their life. It is natural with them and any four that you get together, be they complete strangers to each other, can make a quartette of hermonizing voices. Yesterday morning while I was stiting here writing one of these mitties came up to me and said hello, (in his own language and Hogan doesn't like the language so I can not give you any of the words). From there we, carried on asmething that resembled English for he was better at that than I was with his antive tongue. He saw my bundle of letters and acked if those were from my "illage." I said yes From my parents and friends. "Doy friends of girl friends." he wants to from my parents and friends. "Boy friends or girl friends." he wants to know. I said from both, and he says knew. I such from both, and as says "oh" and saules in a knowing sort of way and then starts an approach these people quite frequently use. I would like to make to you my good friend, he says. Well now this is alright if it's all on the level, but so
