### Gerald Schnell Tells of Pacific Island Natives

A letter from Gerald Schnell, who is with the armed forces somewhere in the Pacific, gives an interesting sidelight on the ways of the natives. He writes:

Forgot all about the natives and with Hogan's (the censor's) permission I will tell you about them. A load of them just went by on their way to work, about forty of them in a truck and all singing at the top of their voices in four part harmony; sounds as if they had rehearsed long and hard but it is all just a part of their life. It is natural with them and any four that you get together, be they complete strangers to each other, can make a quartette of harmonizing voices. Yesterday morning while I was sitting here writing one of these natives came up to me and said hello, (in his own language and Hogan doesn't like the language so I can not give you any of the words). From there we carried on in something that resembled English for he was better at that than I was with his native tongue. He saw my bundle of letters and asked if those were from my "village." I said yes - from my parents and friends. "Boy friends or girl friends." he wants to know. I said from both, and he says "oh" and smiles in a knowing sort of way and then starts an approach these people quite frequently use. I would like to make to you my good friend, he says. Well now this is alright if it's all on the level, but so

often it is just the means to an end, which is "you have one cigarette, please?" There is no R in their alphabet so they generally use "up" in our words that have one. They have no scruples about "bumming" cigarettes and any one foolish enough to pull out a pack is soon surrounded, each waiting his turn to draw on your supply—if it takes them all. So the usual proceeding is issuing a cigarette to be reached in as if you were picking your own pocket and fish out just one, glancing furtively in all directions to make sure a crowd can not form, then slip it to him and walk quickly away before he can ask for one for his brother, never let them get started on this angle because they are sure to have more relatives than you have cigarettes. One of the best occurred yesterday. I saw one of our men operating a

steam roller and a native walked out in front of it, flagged him down and asked for a cigarette. The fellow gave it to him and could not help laughing at the unabashed nerve of the other. But his sense of humor gave out when the guy asked for a match. I think if he could have manipulated the road mangle fast enough he would have made our brown friend look like a glunger bread man. Matches are very scarce, therefore very precious. Getting back to this business of being friends with the natives. They are sometimes very sincere and can give as generously as they take. To say that you will be a friend to one of them is almost like giving yourself over for adoption, and though you may have many acquaintances they expect you to have only one friend. This involves, on your part, cigarettes, candy, conversation, visits to their home etc. In return you may fully expect to freely admire the oldest daughter, receive gifts of native handicraft and bananas. The Mrs. will take your laundry to the family swimming pool and beat the devil out of it against well worn rocks. Whether you pay for this service or sue for damages, depends entirely upon the depth of the friendship. I have not as yet formed any such liaison. Yesterday while skidding tracking this fellow who wanted to take me home for a pet, he said he wanted to tell me about his father who died. I assumed the proper sympathetic look and asked if this occurred recently. "Yes" he said, "about seven years ago." One of our brown friends while clearing brush just now chopped down my radio aerial. So goodbye for now as I now have some more native words to learn and use—G-R-R.

"When I was there I talked with all the garrison and while they admitted that it was a bit lonely all of them were happy and in fine health. Your son is very fortunate as there are several cows and a large number of chickens where he is stationed; thus, he can always have fresh milk and eggs at any time. All things considered, I would gladly trade places with any one of the men stationed there."
