MELVIN COLE TELLS ABOUT ENGLISH 'PUBS'

Mrs. Levine Cole of Somers, has received a very interesting letter from her husband, Melvin Cole who is an X-ray Technician in the U. S. Army, and now stationed somewhere in England. He tells about some of the things he has noticed in England that are different than in the United States, particularly the "pubs," which would be called beer parlors over here. The following is a portion of his letter:

"I sure would like to show you the pubs here as they are usually very old and have a stable in the rear. If you read any of those books that we had around the house by Rafael Segatini you would have a good idea of what I am seeing. The ceilings are very low, and timbers are scarred and have been painted many times, so you can easily imagine the guys with the swords in the good old days. They have names like the Deer's Leap or the Fox and Hound or the Black Swan, which also adds to the color of the place.

"The beer here is served warm, and it is not under pressure in the keg so instead of a tap at the bar there is a two foot handle which the bartender has to pull way down to pump the beer into the glass. The handle is usually carved or else ivory and looks very nice. Glass is very short here so you can't drink out of the bottles and when you get your first drink in a glass you have to use the same glass all night. If you break a glass you have to pay for it and there are laws against taking glasses out of a beer parlor or pub as they call it over here.

"Hardly any of the girls have stockings and clothes are rationed, and have been for some time so they don't have the appearance of the girls at home. The men here are a little different too. You see a farmer in his field and nine times

out of ten he'll have a coat and tie on to work in. They wear huge heavy boots, the likes of which you never saw. They have steel plates and hobbs all over the bottom of them so that they will wear longer. You should hear them walking down the street. The English army boots are the same way too.

"On Sunday here everything closes and it is the quietest day of the week. Everyone gets on his or her bicycle and tours around the country. The pubs open at seven at night and close at ten so that all the time that they are open they are crowded. Somebody plays the piano and everyone sings or else someone gets up and sings for the others. Benches run around the walls and you sit with your beer and stare at the guy across the room from you, if you can see him through the smoke. When I was out the other day we got some fish and chips and then couldn't find any place to eat them so we sat down in the middle of town and put our backs up against a fence and filled our faces while everyone stared at us. The stuff sure tasted good too. The English like the chips with vinegar, but I haven't been brave enough to try it yet. That is the only food we can buy in town as there are no corner cafes with big steaks, no matter how much money you have."
