Six Local Men Die In Action In The South Pacific Battle Region

ALL OF THE YOUNG MEN WERE MEMBERS OF COMPANY "F" OF THE MONTANA NATIONAL GUARD AND WELL KNOWN IN KALISPELL

Relatives in Kalispell received telegrams yesterday from the War department stating that the following members of Company "F", National Guard, had been killed in action in the Southwestern Pacific, presumably in New Guinea:

Sergeant Harold W. Roush, of Kalispell.

Sergeant Harry Billeborough, Kalispell.

Corporal James Ray, Kalispell.

Corporal Harold E. Pulliam, Kalispell.

Ellis Olsen, Bigfork.

Aaron Keating Dickey, Kalispell.

In addition to the above members of Company F, Private Leo R. Johnson, son of Mrs. Ruth Johnson of this city, was reported killed in action in the South Pacific area January 16, evidently in the same battle that claimed the lives of the six men named as being killed in action on subsequent days up to the 20th of January.

This tragic news brought home to Kalispell the terrors of war, and on the streets today men and women were talking over the sad news. Into the homes of the boys killed the news quickly turned them into houses of mourning. It was recalled that during the First World War that something just like this had happened, for the men from any community were scattered widely into different units so that not many were reported killed at the same time.

The Daily Inter Lake has been able to assemble the following facts about the young men:

AARON K. DICKEY

Aaron Keating Dickey, was the son of R. L. Dickey, 102 First avenue west, Kalispell. He was better known in the city as Keating Dickey. He was born in Kalispell and attended the city schools and Flathead county high school, graduating from the latter in 1940. While in high school he was active in music and dramatics, and was a member of the school chorus and boys' quartette. He also was much interested in radio. He was born December 19, 1921, and was 22 years of age at the time of his death. His parents are living in the country at the present time so that it was impossible to contact them today. While at Camp Murray, Keating wrote a weekly letter to the Inter Lake telling the news of the camp and of the boys from Kalispell.
