**WELLS' NEPHEW DIES IN SOUTH PACIFIC**  
Word was received yesterday in Kalspell of the death of Sergeant Herman E. Harris, son of Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Harris, Ashland, Virginia, and a nephew of E. W. Wells of Kalspell. He died in the South Pacific area.  
Herman was the youngest of four brothers in the service. Another nephew of Mr. Wells, Bruce Richardson of Seymour, Iowa, was at Corregidor when it fell, but later escaped to Australia, and is supposed to have been in the New Guinea campaign.

Harris, who was killed in action in the South Pacific on January 13, 1943. The War Department had also awarded Harris the Purple Cross for heroism in the same action. According to the official release of news of his death, "Sergeant Harris was ordered to occupy a knoll on a ridge with a squad of infantry men. The initial attempt to carry out this mission was halted by enemy machine gun fire. Sergeant Harris worked his way up the ridge to a position where he could hurl grenades at the machine gun position. He then led his squad in an attack which resulted in the capture of it. In accomplishing this mission Sergeant Harris made the supreme sacrifice."

**INDIAN SPECTACLE IS VIEWED BY PVT. HOLDEN**

Private Norman Holden has written most interestingly of India to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Holden, in KallsPELL. Excerpts of his letter relate an unusual day for a former resident of the Flathead.

The celebration of an Indian holiday, similar in significance of our Christmas, was the theme of the letter. The locale of the festivities was an Indian Free State nearby his base. It is a province still ruled by a maharaja, independent of the British rule, except for government agreements, etc. He writes:

"There was a festival procession beginning in the maharaja's palace grounds, proceeding out through the village thoroughfare, finally assembling at the parade grounds where the official ceremonies took place. The procession consisted mainly of a general display of the maharaja's palace guard, his horses, coaches, carriages, all decked out in the most elaborate of ornamentations and decorations. The procession also included several elephants and one live bull, the latter of the deer species. The procession was headed by an elephant mounted by three Indians who were making a great deal of racket beating on drums and metal discs. There followed units of his highnesses' palace guard and these were followed by Indian bands and more soldiers and finally his highness on a large elephant, followed by officials, relatives, etc., on elephants and in coaches.

"Outside of a South American marsh grass, this is probably one of the most colorful ceremonies to be seen anywhere at any time.

"Activities at the parade grounds consisted of guard formation and a 51-gun cannon salute and guard review."

Later the letter describes visiting the bazaar which he likens to a carnival mingled with hundreds of small shops. He said there was a motorcycle tank performer. He went to the state house which is a beautiful modern structure and described the lobby as very gorgeous with superb furniture. He said the atmosphere was somewhat like that of the Davenport lobby. Magnificent chandeliers and lovely furniture was noted by the writer. He then went to the maharaja's palace and was met by a reception group of his highness' representatives and state officials. They viewed the throne which was

an exquisite chair with gold figured arms and legs. After dinner, the group assembled in the entertainment room where singing, dancing and instrumental music was furnished.

"In closing, I would like to mention that despite my enthusiasm in connection with this event, I am not thrilled by the fact that such things exist because I recognize it to be one of the great evils of India and something to be done away with. I have seen the poverty of India and the common people and have heard of starving thousands and therefore cannot see myself favoring such things. Any interest which I might have indicated is purely from a curiosity satisfying standpoint," Private Holden writes.

**LT. HOWSER, FORMER  
CRESTON MAN, DIES  
IN JAP PRISON CAMP**

A letter from Mrs. H. R. Zeltz of Portland tells of the death in a Japanese prison camp of Lieutenant James M. Howser, a former Flathead county boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Howser of Creston. He moved to Pomona, California, with his family some years ago, and enlisted from there. The following account is from the Pomona Progress-Bulletin:

Lieutenant James M. (Jim) Howser, who was taken prisoner by the Japs when the Philippine islands fell in the spring of 1942, died in a Japanese internment camp in the islands, his mother, Mrs. Grace L. Howser of 755 W. 11th street, was informed Tuesday afternoon in a letter from the United States war department.

Notified earlier by telegram, Mrs. Howser was instructed that a letter would follow. The letter, which was signed by Major General J. A. Ullo, adjutant, arrived in Pomona Tuesday. It read as follows:

"It was with deep regret that you were notified by a recent telegram of the death of your son, Second Lieutenant James L. Howser, Infantry in the South west Pacific area.

"The casualty report in his case shows that he died at a prisoner of war camp, Philippine islands, as a result of beriberi, but fails to give the exact date of his death. Efforts to obtain such information have not been successful.

"From the meager information obtainable from the Japanese government, through the International Red Cross, the war department regards him as being dead from the date of the dispatch of the reporting message, July 1, 1943.

"May the thought that he gave his life heroically in the service of his country be of sustaining comfort to you."

Howser, who was reported a Jap prisoner last January, joined the army six years ago as a private. He had come to Pomona with his family in 1936.

Stationed at Fort MacArthur for four years, Howser had risen to the rank of sergeant when he applied for overseas service. He was assigned to join the forces of General Douglas MacArthur in the Philippines. He was on duty in the islands at the time of the first attack by the Japs.

Mrs. Howser learned of the promotion of her son to the rank of second lieutenant in March, 1942, when he wrote her a letter from the field in Bataan. The letter was dated February 8 and told that he was "oksy" but seeing action against the enemy.
