INDIAN SPECTACLE IS VIEWED BY PVT. HOLDEN

Private Norman Holden has writ-ten most interestingly of India to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Hol-den, in Kaltspell. Excerpts of his let-ter relate an unusual day for a for-mer resident of the Flathead.

The celebration of an Indian holi-day, similar in significance of our Christians, was the theme of the letter. The locale of the festivities was ter. The locate of the festivities was an indian Free State nearby his base. It is a province still ruled by a maharaja, independent of the Britisq rule, except for government agreements, etc. He writes:

"There was a festival procession beginning in the maharaja's palace grounds, proceeding out through the prounds, proceeding out through the vilage thoroughfare, finally assembling at the parade grounds where the official ceremonies took place. The procession consisted mainly of a seneral display of the mahraja's colace guard, his horses, coaches, actriages, all deciced out in the most claborate of ornamentations and facorations. The procession also influed by the latter of the deer spetime. The procession was headed by an clephant mounted by three latteriums the procession was headed by an clephant mounted by three latters were making a great deal. an elephant mounted by three in-dians who were making a great deal of racket beating on drums and mettic dises. There followed units of his highnesses' palace guard and these were followed by Indian bands and more soldiers and finally his dighness on a large elephant, fol-lowed by officials, relatives, etc., on "lephants and in coaches.

tandi gras, this is probably one of the most colorful coremonies to be seen saywhere at any time. "Activities at the parade grounds consisted of guard formation and a 51-gun cannon salute and guard review."

Later the letter describes visiting the bazaar which he likens to a car-sivel mingled with hundreds of small shops. He said there was a moleccycle tank performer. He went motorycle tank performer. He went in the state house while is a beau-liful medern structure and described the lobby as very grogeous with appendid, furniture. He gaid its at-thosphere, was somewhat like that of the Davesport lobby. Magnificent chandellers and lovely furniture was holed by the writer. He shee went to the mahraja's palace and was met by a reception group of his highness' representatives and state officials. They viewed the throne which was

an exquisite chair with gold figured arms and legs. After dinner, the group assembled in the entertainment room where singling, dunling and instrumental music was furnish.

"In closing, I would like to men-tion that despite my enthusiasm in connection with this event, I am not thrilled by the fact that such things exist because I recognize it to be one of the great evils of India and one of the great evils of India and soluething to be done away with. I have seen the proverty of India and the common people and have heard of starving thousands and therefore cannot see myself favoring such things. Any interest which I might have indicated is purely from a curi-osity satisfying standpoint," Private Holden writes.
