SGT. WARD KIRKPATRICK IS AWARDED FIRST OAK LEAF CLUSTER TO MEDAL

Washington, June 24—(AP)—Members of the Eighth Air Force received over 1,000 decorations for intense air action against Germany and German-occupied Europe, the war department announced today.

Army air force officials reported that the list of decorations is the largest ever made in one announcement from any theater. It includes the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, and the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal.

The exploits recognized in the awards cover a period of several months.

The list includes: Montana:

Distinguished Flying Cross—Tech. Sgt. Oliver A. Hamilton, Stevensville; Staff Sgt. Norman Gilkey, Butte.

First Oak Leaf Cluster to Air Medal—Sgt. Ward W. Kirkpatrick, Kalispell; First Lieut. Harry J. Thomson, Health; Staff Sgt. Harry J. Dordy, Bloomfield; Staff Sgt. Oscar R. Green, Great Falls; Staff Sgt. Lloyd L. Troway, Miles City.

(Sgt. Kirkpatrick has been reported missing in action since last month.)

Sgt. Kirkpatrick Kalispell Airman, Given Air Medal

London, March 30—(AP)—The oak leaf cluster has been added to air medals previously earned by two Montana army men, the Eighth Air Force announces.

The recipients were Sgt. Oscar R. Green, Great Falls, Mont., and Tech.

Ward Kirkpatrick Reported Missing In Action Monday

The many friends of Staff Sergeant Ward W. Kirkpatrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kirkpatrick of Kalispell, will be shocked to learn that he has been reported lost in action, according to a telegram received Monday evening by Mr. and Mrs. Kirkpatrick.

No details were given in the telegram, which came from the Adjutant General of the War Department. The telegram read as follows:

"I regret to inform you that the commanding general, European area, reports your son, Staff Sergeant Ward W. Kirkpatrick, missing in action since May 15. If further details or other information of his status are received you will be promptly notified."

Ward was a bombardier on a Flying Fortress and had made numerous trips over enemy country in the course of his duty. In March he was one of several Montana men who received the oak leaf cluster added to an air medal for meritorious achievement while in action over enemy territory.

Missing in action does not necessarily mean that Kirkpatrick was

(Continued from page 1) killed, for his plane might have been ripped and he and the rest of the crew bailed out and were taken prisoners or in hiding in friendly hands. Steps are being taken today through the Red Cross to learn if this was possible.

Sgt. Kirkpatrick graduated from Flathead county high school with the class of '41 at the age of 16 years and enlisted in the Army Air Force on December 27, 1941. He attended the Army Air Corps technical school at Lowry Field, Denver, Colo., graduating from this school May 10, 1942. Following his graduation the Flathead youth, with nine other air corps student selected by army officials, was sent to St. Louis, Mo., for an eight-weeks course of intensive training at an advanced Army Air school, and became qualified as an aerial gunner and ball power turret specialist. Later he was transferred to Boise, Idaho, where he acted as an instructor. From there he was sent to New Mexico, and then to Biggs Field, San Antonio, Texas.

He arrived in England September 1, 1942, and was with the first group of all-American planes which bombed Germany.

It will be noted that Sergeant Kirkpatrick was a veteran as time is counted during a modern war. Up to this time he had been very fortunate, as many of his associates must have been lost in action since last September, when he landed in England.

Until further details are received his friends hope that he is still alive and well.
