LALUM HOME AFTER FINISHING 50 MISSIONS</p> <p>Staff Sergeant Luther Lalum, the youngest son of Mrs. Esther Lalum, formerly of KallsPELL and now residing in Whitefish, arrived home from the southern European theater of war, November 26.</p> <p>Lalum, a graduate of Flathead County high school and for three years a guard on the Varsity football team, enlisted in the Air Corps, January 8, 1942, and received his training at Sheppard Field, Texas.</p> <p>He was assigned to an engineer-gunner to a B-25 Mitchell medium bomber and headed to Africa February 23, 1943, and took part in the bombings in North Africa, Panteloria, Sicily, Italy and his last six flights were made over the Balkans. In all he has completed his 50 bombing missions over enemy territory.</p> <p>Although reticent about talking of his experience, young Lalum did say, "I guess I was lucky. When we arrived in Africa, air power was about even but as our fighters gained experience they soon began knocking the Nazis out of the skies. Your first mission is the hardest. Once you get into the thick of it, you are so busy taking care of yourself and your plane you don't think about being frightened."</p>	<p>His squadron fought two engagements with the Herman Goering Yellow Noses, the crack flyers of the Luftwaffe but completed their mission and returned to their base.</p> <p>On a mission over Italy, he was wounded by a piece of flak and was hospitalized for 10 days. His decorations include the Air medal with eight clusters for completing 50 bombing missions and the Purple Heart for being wounded in action. He flew in a plane named, "Rough Stuff, The Exterminator." It was not shot down and no losses were sustained among the crew.</p> <p>He is leaving December 15 for the replacement center at Santa Monica, Calif., where he will receive a new assignment. Two other brothers are also in the service. So far as is known, Lalum is the first Flathead boy to have completed 50 bombing missions.</p>

JANE LA MUNYON IN NAVY'S FIRST AIR INSTRUCTOR CLASS

Washington, July 26 — (AP) — Woman naval officers are to be used as instructors in aerial navigation, the navy reported today, in announcing that the first class to begin training for this new duty will enter the Naval Air Navigation School at Hollywood Beach, Fla., August 7.

There the women will receive training identical that given male instructors and will have a number of hours of flying before they go out to naval flight preparatory, pre-flight and primary training centers where they will teach navigation to future aviators.

The navy said the first class of women at Hollywood Beach will include five Wave emsigns already serving in naval aviation.

Included in the first class is Jane La Munyon of Kalispell, Mont., who is on duty at the Dallas, Tex., air station.

Lynch, commanding officer of the Air Depot Training Station at this field. He will return to Will Rogers Field on completion of his course for duty with the service group of which he is a member. Private Lawlor is a former resident of Kalspell, Montana. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert J. Lawlor of 423 Sixth avenue west. Before joining the army, he was employed by the Livingston Publishing company of Livingston, Montana. His brothers—Thomas E., Timothy, J., Earl V., and Francis L.—are also in the army.

SGT. ALBERT LAWLOR SEES LONDON SIGHTS

Sergeant Albert W. Lawlor has written his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Lawlor of Kalspell, describing his visit to London recently. He saw Pleadilly circus, Trafalgar square Hyde park, St. James park, watched the charge of guard at Buckingham palace, saw the famous door at No. 10 Downing street, saw the inside of Westminster Abbey and also went through St. Paul's cathedral. Parliament buildings were viewed and he heard Big Ben strike the hours.

On his sight-seeing trip, the sergeant saw the Lambeth walk, crossed London bridge and Tower bridge and saw the Tower of London. An attendant took him through the famous old Bailey's court building, including the dungeon prison. The famous wax museum was viewed, where there are most of the outstanding character of history molded in wax, life size and dressed in their original clothes. He also viewed the chamber of horrors where most of the notorious criminals of England are on display as well as the methods of torture used in medieval times.

There are many soap-box orators in Hyde park. They talk on all subjects. The American soldier usually have a good, fast bull game in progress here at the same time. London has a vast subway system.

Oxford circus, Pleadilly and Regent street offered a great deal of historical significance. There are some large American department stores, soda fountains, etc. The streets are colorful with the uniforms of many nations, even the women are in uniform. Veterans of the First World War wear their campaign ribbons. There is a blackout every night.

Sergeant Lawlor formerly was a linotype operator for the Daily Inter Lake. His London trip was in company with a friend with whom he used to work on the Enterprise at Livingston, Mont.

Albert W. Lawlor, formerly of Kalspell, who was sent to the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, for special instruction, has been transferred to the Army Air Base at Hattiesburg, Miss. He was formerly a member of the Inter Lake force, but went to Livingston, where he enlisted in the army.

Living Conditions Good in England—Albert Lawlor of Kalspell, formerly an employe of the Inter Lake who is now in England with the armed services, has written a letter to friends in the city telling some thing of his experiences. He said in part:

"Had a good trip across, and finally realized how big an ocean is. Water, water, as far as you can see, day after day. That old ground underfoot sure felt good again.

"Have had the opportunity to travel quite a bit and have been to Edinburgh and Glasgow in Scotland, as well as many cities in England. Was at Oxford recently and saw the University buildings. There are many such places to visit.

"Believe it or not, our living conditions are much better than in the States. The food is excellent. We can get American cigarettes here for 5¢ a pack (no tax). So, with good food and plenty of smokes, a guy can't kick.

"We are getting along fine with the English people. The Americans have them all jitterbugging like nobody's business. Don't know what the Tommies will think when they get back and find their girls all 'Americanized.'

"You should see the blackouts here. Every night, not a light anywhere. People go around smashing into each other. It is comical at times. By the way, we can't praise the Red Cross too highly. Don't know what we would do without them. They are everywhere to help us. They are doing a grand job and we are all for them."

A letter from Lloyd Absolonson asks for a change of address on his Weekly Inter Lake.

He says, "I haven't much else to say, except that we are a hell of a long way from home, and that we will all be glad when this war is over and we can return to our home towns.

We have a lot of mosquitoes over here and have to have mosquito nets over our cots while sleeping, and in the day have to wear mosquito nets around our heads."

He also says he would like to tell what kind of a unit he is in and what the main purpose is, but that is a military secret.
