Interesting Letter From Italy Written By Sundahl

George A Sundahl, private first class, has written his mother, Mrs. Caroline Sundahl of 527 Third avenue west, Kalispell, in an interesting manner from Italy. Before arriving there, he was in Africa and saw Casablanca, Rabat and many points which have been prominent in the news. He asks in a joking manner if his mother would like a Rembrandt painting from Italy and says that probably \$20,000 would buy one.

He writes that much of the country in Italy reminds him of northwest Montana. The gently rolling foothills are mentioned. Grapes, apples, figs, olives, lemons, pomegranates and many types of nuts grow there. They also raise grains and garden crops and although it seems that crops are plentiful he says that he has seen very little live stock. Much hand work is done on the farms and plowing is done with oxen. The women carry huge loads on their heads but it is considered disgraceful for men to. The people seem healthy and happy, are of sturdy but short stature. The farm people dress simply but those in cities are clad like residents of the States. He says the rations are good and they generally prepare their meals over little gas stoves.

Mentioning placing his trust in God, he says nothing seems to worry him. This part of his letter is similar to thoughts of many of the servicemen and form a source of satisfaction to their parents.
