Lloyd Wiley, who was believed lost when the Cruiser Houston was sunk in the battle of Java on February 27, 1942, is alive and interned as a prisoner of war in a Japanese camp at Moulmein, Burma, it has been learned.
His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Wiley have received a post card from him, saying that he is well and with friends, and not to worry. He adds that he is working at three ruypos per month, which is the equivalent of 10 cents per day.
The card was a regular form issued by the Japanese War Department.
