Pfc. Walter L. Howell, son of Mrs. Elmer Howell of Columbia Falls, has written an amusing description of jungle life in a letter to his mother. In summing up, he states "All in all, life in the jungle is 'stinko' as far as I'm concerned. The sooner I get out of here, the better I'll like it."

He tells of landing on a beach where the shoreline is rather pretty with coconut palms growing in neat rows. Then a place has to be cleared for a camp by hacking with a machete, which looks something like a corn knife. Vines are cut away and the grass from the ground, as jungle rats hide in it and carriers of typhus bite. Ants then drop from the trees and vines onto the men.

"You can imagine how comfortable you feel with about 40 dozen ants crawling around on your clothes and inside of them. When this happens, it is only natural for a guy to want to get rid of the little red devils!
