LIEUT. WAYNE A. WENDT KILLED IN ACTION ON AIR RAID OVER REICH

Mr. and Mrs. Gus Wendt, Jr., of Creston, Montana, received a telegram from the War department stating that their son, First Lieutenant Wayne A. Wendt was killed in action November 13, 1944. He had previously been reported missing in action.

Lt. Wendt enlisted in the Army Air Corps in May, 1942, while attending the University of Montana at Missoula where he was affiliated with the Theta Chi fraternity and from which institution he received a B. A. degree.

The 27-year-old pilot received his wings and commission as Second Lieutenant at the Douglas, Arizona, Army Air field on February 8, 1944. After completion of training as first pilot of a B-17 (Flying Fortress) bomber, he entered foreign service August 3, 1944.

LT. WAYNE WENDT MET DEATH IN AERIAL RAID ON BLECHHAMMER

In a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Gus Wendt, Jr., of Creston, from the War department, some details concerning the death of their son, First Lt. Wayne A. Wendt, were stated. The pilot met death on November 13, 1944. He was piloting a Fortress on a secret night bombing mission over Blechhammer Oil refinery in southern Germany. The mission was described as a "low wall" one as each plane flew singly to the target which is considered one of the four most difficult in the world.

His combat crew was issued their new fly-away strip at Kearney Field, Neb., and it was christened "Silver Doll" and flown to a Fifteenth Army Air Force base in southern Italy. Upon arrival in Italy, he was promoted to first lieutenant, the commission which he held at the time of his death. Lt. Wendt had been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement and according to last information, had completed more than 30 missions.

Rev. O. A. White passed away Sunday in Helena. Rev. White was about 88 years of age and until about 26 years ago, made his home in Kalspell where he was district superintendent for the Methodist church. He later lived at Rollins and Polson. **RICHARD L. WILHELM
KILLED IN ACTION
AT SEA OFF IWO JIMA**

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Wilhelm of Swan Lake and Ceram have been notified by the Navy department that their son Richard L. Wilhelm, S 1/c, was killed in action in the sinking of the "Bismarck Sea" Feb. 21 at Iwo Jima.

At first he was reported missing, but a letter from Capt. John L. Bratt, commanding officer of the "Bismarck Sea" reveals that part of the ship where Richard's battle station was, received severe damage from a Jap fier's attack early in the action, so no hope of his escape was possible.

He graduated from Columbia Falls high school in 1944, enlisting in the U. S. N. R. before graduation. He received his training at Carroll College at the naval base at San Diego.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilhelm have another son, Pat Wilhelm, A. M. M. S/r, who is attached to Flight Unit 1 as a mechanic.
