Pfc. Harold Johnson
Writes From Germany

Mr. and Mrs. K. B. Johnson of Bigfork recently received a letter from their son, Pfc. Harold Johnson, who is somewhere in Germany. He said he is living in a German home from which the Germans have been chased, and while writing was using a German chair and a German dining room table for a desk.

He says "there is hatred in Europe today, which people at home have never known, and with I hope, never know. I have heard the whine of the sniper's bullet and have seen dead German soldiers lying in a ditch, but haven't shot at anything yet."

"We have overwhelmed the Germans, and the American army makes war with a vengeance that is unsurpassed. We have to be on the alert at all times, and I find myself watchful for objects which a German may have in his hand or on his person. Distrust of the Nazi means longer life for me and my buddies. It seems that nothing is sacred in combat, except duty."

"So far there is nothing of which I am certain. I haven't seen Hitler, and am okay, and am ready for what comes next."

Back From Europe

With the 13th Armored Division in the Assembly Area, Command--En route to the United States from the European continent, Pfc. Harold W. Johnson of Bigfork, Montana, is now being processed at Camp Atlanta in northeastern France, as a member of the first ETO armored division to be ordered to the Pacific.

Following treatment in a field hospital, he was flown to Saipan, and the United States, arriving at Meigs June 5. On Saipan, he found the native women working in the hospitals as ward attendants and doing a good job of it.

Julian wears the American Defense ribbon with one star indicating his overseas duty at the time of Pearl Harbor. He also wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one star.
