Tidrick was brought to the states from the South Pacific after being wounded seriously for the second time.

Lieut. Carlton Tidrick is home on a 30-day furlough after a long, hard struggle in the South Pacific. Tidrick has been wounded seriously twice. His many friends are happy to see him home again and in such good condition. He was sent to the states for hospitalization and has been in Spokane for the past few weeks. After his furlough here, he will return to Spokane. He expects to return to active combat after a period of a few months of limited duty in the states, which will follow his hospitalization. Lt. Carlton Tidrick Is Awarded Silver Star

Lieut. Carlton Tidrick has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action, according to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Tidrick of Bolton. Lieut. Tidrick is also the wearer of the D. S. C. with clusters, the Purple Heart and other citations for his services with the ground forces in the Southwest Pacific.

The citation for his most recent award reads: "For gallantry in action near Plosoyapoon, Leyte, P. I., on November 24, 1944. During an attack on a strongly entrenched enemy position on the peak of a hill, Lieutenant Tidrick and an assigned man moved within ten yards of an enemy machine gun which was laying down heavy fire on our troops. Using rifles and grenades they silenced the gun, but both were seriously wounded. Lieut. Tidrick's gallant action, performed with disregard for his own personal safety, was a major factor in the success of the attack which resulted in the killing of many enemy, the rout of the remainder and the capture of much material." The citation was issued by command of Major General Gibb.

Lieut. Tidrick has received his honorable army discharge and he and his wife are leaving soon for Seward, Alaska, where he has a position with the bank there. They are at present at the home of Mr. Tidrick's parents in Alaska.

Charles Tilson and family are visiting at his father's home in the Swan River community. He carries the equivalent of eight battle stars and a lot of ribbon. He was a fireman on one of the flat-tops which made history in the Pacific.
