**Ulrich Promote Home**  
 With The 25th Division, Assembly Area Command, France—Pfc. William L. Ulrich is chronic home from Europe with the 25th Infantry Division, which in ten months has led across the Rhine river to within 12 miles from Berlin.

The 25th ended its occupational duties in Germany during the second week of July and moved to Camp Norfolk, one of the assembly area commands' 17, redeployment areas near Heins, Elements of the Division served as honor guard for President Truman when he arrived at Antwerp.

During Omaha Beach, July 7, 1944, the 25th fought the German front line, broke the counter-attack at Mortain, swept across France, cracked into Germany's Saar valley on December 13, and then slipped into Belgium and Luxembourg to within 700 yards of Aachen bridge.

Following a shift to the Vonges mountains, the division dashed 200 miles north through Holland to mop the floor and Rhine rivers, cross the Siegfried Line defenses, and mop up more than 50,000 PW's in 45 days, to mark the end of more than 1600 combat miles in the ETO.
