		<p><b>COL. HUBERT ZEMKE FREED FROM NAZI WAR PRISONER CAMP</b></p> <p>Missoula, May 11.—(AP)—It took an end of the war in Europe to stop Col. Hubert Zemke of Missoula, one of Montana's outstanding combat heroes.</p> <p>Official notification was received last night by Mrs. Zemke that her husband had been liberated in the latter part of April, after having crash-landed in Germany last Oct. 21 while escorting bombers on a mission to Hamburg.</p> <p>On liberation, Colonel Zemke immediately organized and commanded a prisoner of war army and led it into combat in the last hectic days of Germany's collapse, capturing 2,800 Nazis. He led a group of men in ground operations unfamiliar to his customary sky combat with unusual success.</p> <p>Official word of his feats were received at Missoula through Rep. Mike Mansfield (R-Mont) who quoted the war department on his liberation and subsequent deeds.</p>
