Commended for Outstanding Performance of Duty as War-Time Ordnance Planning Officer



Captain Archibald E. Uehlinger, U. S. N., has been awarded a commendation and ribbon for his outstanding performance of duty as war-time ordnance planning officer, Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton. The presentation was made in Washington, D. C., by Vice Admiral George F. Hussey, Jr., U. S. N., chief of the bureau of ordnance. The citation reads: "For outstanding performance of duty as ordnance planning officer, industrial department, Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Washington, during the last 16 months of World War II. An expert organizer, Captain Uehlinger was instrumental in planning all work in connection with repairs, alterations, and design of ordnance and ordnance radar equipment, on one occasion devising an improvement in the design of battleship turret controls which decisively increased reliability and firing rate. By his thorough planning, extensive combat and design experience and tireless effort, he effected the timely completion of scheduled repairs, thus assuring the rapid return of ships to the battle line. His steadfast devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval service." Captain Uehlinger's home address is Kalispell, Montana. He is now on duty in the ammunition research section of the Bureau of Ordnance.
