M-GARVEY RECEIVES WORLD WAR I MEDAL 29 YEARS AFTER

After waiting nearly 29 years, A. M. McGarvey of this city received an army of occupation (Germany) medal for service in World War I. The medal arrived Monday from the War Department in Washington, D. C.

During the first World War, Mr. McGarvey served with the artillery in the 91st division and was in Europe for 19 months, with four months in the army of occupation in Germany following the signing of the armistice Nov. 11, 1918.

Mr. McGarvey said that the colonel under whom he was serving informed the men in the army of occupation that they would be awarded medals for time spent in Germany following the end of the war. As time went on and the medal was not awarded he forgot about it, and the arrival of the medal at this extremely late date came as a great surprise. He said he had no way of accounting for the long delay.
