 CUT BANK (AP) — A 19-year-old Cut Bank youth was killed and three others injured Friday night in a one-car crash on U.S. 2, just west of the Cut Bank city limits.

The investigating highway patrolman identified the dead youth as James Durocher. Hospitalized in Cut Bank and reported in fair condition were Stephen LaBranche, 17, Scott Austin, 16, and Pat Howell, 17, all of Cut Bank. A fourth youth, Mike McCormick, 20, suffered only minor injuries, authorities said.

The Highway Patrol said Durocher was believed to be the driver. Officers said the vehicle plunged off the highway, struck a boulder and overturned.

The death raised Montana's 1970 traffic fatality toll to 107, compared with 121 on the same date last year.
