Mrs. Moran has not made any statement to officials upon recommendation of counsel. Douglas said any charges which might be filed would be based upon the outcome of an autopsy performed Saturday afternoon. There were five knife wounds on Moran's body apparently inflicted with a long blade of a pocket knife found at the scene.

How the wounds were inflicted is something authorities still have to determine. Douglas said Mrs. Moran had been released without charge to care for her small son. Working in the investigation are Libby Police Chief Eldon Welch, Lincoln County Coroner Hal Gompf and Douglas.

Douglas said Saturday. "There are several factors which must be pursued further before the county attorney's office decides what route might be followed in prosecution. Right now we're looking at murder two because the only persons in the house to the best of our information were the victim, Mrs. Moran and the child," Douglas said.
