Wreck claims another victim

A one-car accident which occurred about three miles west of Kalispell last Wednesday has claimed another life.

Scott Audette, 15, of Kalispell died Tuesday in Missoula Community Hospital from injuries he received in the accident.

Audette was the driver of a car which overturned on Three Mile Drive, killing Randy Beaton, 14. Audette had been listed in critical

condition since the crash. A second passenger in the vehicle, Jeffrey V. Baker, Kalispell, is listed in satisfactory condition at Kalispell Regional Hospital.

Audette was Montana's 25th highway victim in 1977 compared to 38 fatalities on March 2, 1976.

Services for Audette will be at 10 a.m. Friday at the Weatherford Funeral Home with burial to follow in a local cemetery.
