

Judge Foot Dies

6 Aug 1988

Judge Eugene B. Foot, age 85, who had resided at 396 - 2nd Avenue East North, died at his Lakeside home on Tuesday. He was born February 19, 1895, in the family home at 320 - 5th Avenue East in Kalispell, a son of Charles H. and Theresa Foot. His father, also an attorney, moved here in 1891. Judge Foot attended Kalispell schools, graduating from the Flathead County High School in the class of 1913. He had served in the Machine Gun Company of the U.S. Army in France for 18 months during World War I.

He had attended the University of Minnesota and was a graduate of the Montana State University Law School in the class of 1921. On August 18, 1925, he was married to Nina Hopper, a Kalispell native, in Spokane, Washington. Following his graduation from Law School he had entered practice with his father. In 1929, Ted Aronson joined the firm, and in 1942, the firm of Foot, Aronson and Foot was changed to Foot and Aronson. He continued in private practice until 1957 when he was appointed by Gov. I. Hugo Aronson as Judge of the 11th Judicial District, serving with Judge Dean King, a position he held until his retirement in 1969.

Judge Foot had also served as Kalispell City attorney from 1941 to 1949; as deputy County Attorney from 1951 to 1956, and as State Representative for four terms, in 1927, 1943, 1945, and 1947. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church; a 61 year member and Past Commander of Flathead Post #7, American Legion; World War I Barracks; Kalispell Masonic Lodge #42 A.F.&A.M.; Royal Arch Masons; Cyrene Commandry; Past/Commander of the Knights of

Pythia; Algeria Shrine; Longtime member of Kalispell Kiwanis; Life Member of Kalispell Elks Lodge; Member of National Bar Association; Montana Bar Association and the Northwest Montana Bar Association.

He was preceded in death by his parents and one sister, Katharine, and is now survived by his wife, Nina, at home; four sisters, Dorothy Foot of Heron, Montana, Jessie Foot Charboneau of Bruce Crossing, Michigan, Isabelle Foot Koski of Ely, Minnesota and Helen Foot Buell of Middlebush, New Jersey; and several nephews and nieces. Funeral services for Judge Foot will be conducted at 2 p.m. on Friday in the First Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Dr. Odin A. Baugh officiating. Burial will be in the family plot in the Conrad Memorial Cemetery under the direction of the Johnson Funeral Home.
