Clyde Rector, the man who was found innocent of murdering Montana highway patrolman Michael Ren in April 1978, apparently shot himself to death Sunday night at a cabin in the Bob Marshall Wilderness Area.

Rector's body was discovered Monday afternoon by Forest Service Ranger Mark Stanley in a Forest Service cabin at Salmon Forks along the South Fork of the Flathead River.

Rector recently had been released from the Warm Springs State

County Attorney Ted Lympus said Rector had written District Judge James Salansky from Warm Springs, suggesting that if the assault charge was not pursued, he would go live with his mother in North Carolina after his release.

Lympus said he had a written agreement with Rector that he would defer prosecution on the charge if Rector would go to North Carolina.

Lympus said he received a letter dated June 19 from the state hospital that said Rector would be released within 10 days.

Hospital, where he had been sent after striking a Flathead County sheriff's deputy.

Flathead County Sheriff Al Rierison said Stanley was making a check of the cabin, which appeared to have been broken into, when he found Rector's body stretched out on a bunk in the cabin.

Rierison said a .22 caliber semi-automatic rifle was found lying beside the body. Rector apparently put the gun in his mouth and pulled the trigger, Rierison said. A backpack containing some clothes and about \$100 was found in the cabin, he said. There was no indica-

tion Rector had been camping, and no food in the cabin had been eaten, Rierison added.

ever knew he was in the area," Lympus said.

On April 8, 1978, Rector shot and killed Ren in an exchange of shots after Ren had stopped him in Eureka about 3:30 that afternoon.

The incident began with Ren chasing Rector at a high rate of speed through Eureka. Rector claimed Ren pointed a gun at him after he stopped.

"I thought he was going to blow me away," Rector told the Associated Press in Helena, which had called the house in which Rector had taken two men hostage after the incident.

A coroner's jury will be impounded today to view the body, and an autopsy will be performed, he said.

Rector had been in Warm Springs after striking an officer in Martin City. The officer was trying to arrest him on a mental health charge.

Rector had a long history of mental illness.

He was charged with aggravated assault in February and sent to Warm Springs for a 90-day evaluation.

He was a member of the Whitefish Methodist Church.

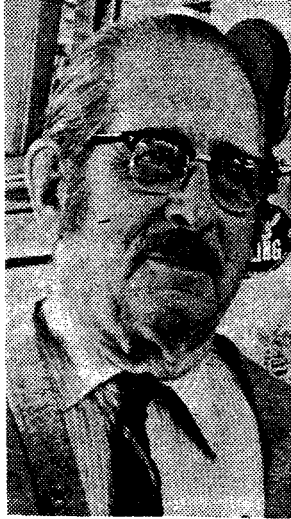
