Gordon 'Bud' Daugharty, 90

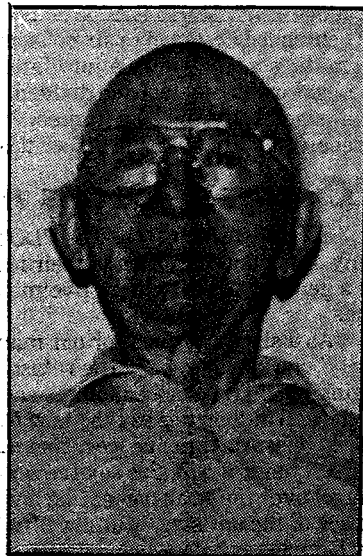

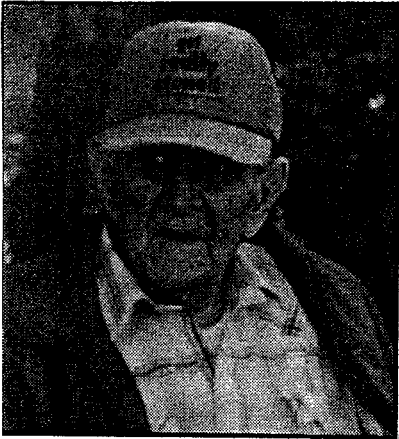
