Naturalist Larry Thompson, :

Kalispell native Larry Thompson, who brought the state's natural history alive in books, magazine articles and paintings, died just after midnight today in Helena of a cancerous tumor of the brain.

He was the son of Roger and Lee Thompson.

Thompson, 39, was a professional wildlife biologist whose enthusiasm for his subject spilled over into articles, paintings, and the book, "Montana Explorers: The Pioneer Naturalists," published in 1985.

"He brought a level of sheer enthusiasm to observing things in nature," said Mark Thompson, the director of publications for American Geographic Publishing, who

worked with him on his book. Mark Thompson and Larry Thompson were not related.

"He passed his enthusiasm along to everyone who worked with him," said Mark Thompson. "He was interested in the silliest, most minute things. He was under contract to write a book on North American wild rodents, and he was as happy studying shrews, voles and rats as anything else."

He wrote and edited books on the distribution of Montana's animals, and compiled a bibliography of technical papers on wildlife published between 1950 and 1976.

"He was really interested in nature," said Thompson. "I know there are lots of nerdy people out there who are stuffy and serious

about the subject, but Larry always cracked a smile. He had a sense of humor about himself. And he gave generously of his time to the Audubon Society, and anyone who needed someone to speak and interpret things."

Even before he attended college, he worked for the Department of Fish and Game in Kalispell, counting fish, and he continued working summers here while he attended college.

He attended Montana State University and Washington State University and had lived in Helena since 1974. He worked for Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation for 12 years, and most recently has served as program manager for the Natural Resource Information System administered by the State Library.

His watercolors and pen-and-ink drawings focus on wildlife, landscapes, and Helena-area architecture. His pictures of white-tailed deer, sage grouse and other Montana animals have been featured in Montana Outdoors. He has written more than 40 technical articles on wildlife.

In 1985 he received an award from the Montana Audubon Council for an article on birdwatching that was published in Montana Outdoors.

His precisely rendered studies of flowers and butterflies done in a photographic style were apparently done for illustration or his own enjoyment, said Thompson. "They were gorgeous things, he had them hanging in his house, but as far as I know, he never attempted to market them in a commercial way, he just donated the use of a few of them for publications."

When he became ill this summer, his friends had prints made of some of his works to help his family meet mounting medical expenses.

"The funny thing about his book — it was 500 typewritten pages — he had done it purely as a labor of love, trying to document the first people who came to Montana and left any kind of intelligent record of what they saw here. He had done it on his own because he thought it ought to be done."

Thompson leaves a wife, Sue, and a daughter, Katie.
