

She worked non-stop in several radio shows in Los Angeles and met her husband, the late John McIntire, while he was a radio announcer in L.A. He joined her in New York in 1935, while she was performing on "March of Time" and he became the announcer for the program.

It wasn't long before Orson Welles, a fellow actor from the Mercury Theatre, asked her to star as Lady Mac-Beth. She made her film debut in Welles' classic production of "Mac-Beth" in 1947.

She starred with John Wayne and Jimmy Stewart in "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance," Glenn Ford in "The Big Heat" and Audie Murphy an "The Guns of Fort Petticoat." She played Rock Hudson's mother in "Avalanche" and Mickey Rooney's mother (although they were almost the same age at the time) in "Words and Music."

She said the highlight of her stage career was playing Helen Keller's teacher, Anne Sullivan, in "The Miracle Worker." Keller attended a performance, felt her face and declared, "You are my teacher!"

Her illustrious television career included performances with and without her husband. They starred as the Grangers, a married couple in the western "The Virginian" and she appeared as a guest star in many episodes of her husband's successful series, "Wagon Train." She enjoyed working with him more than anyone

else and they appeared in many programs including "Charlie's Angels," "The Love Boat," "Night Court," a made for television "Lassie" movie, as well as the feature film, "Cloak and Dagger."

She appeared in more than 300 episodic television programs. She also starred in three of her own series: "Hotel De Paree," "The Richard Boone Anthology Series" and the popular favorite, "Dirty Sally." The latter show was the very first spinoff of a successful series ("Gunsmoke"). She received four Emmy nominations and was voted most popular television actress by a viewers' group for her work in "Dirty Sally." That character even guest-starred on "The Sonny and Cher Show."

In the later years of her life, her versatile voice could be heard in Disney's animated films "The Rescuers" and "The Fox and the Hound," in which she starred as Widow Tweed. For the last 12 years, she was a leading performer in the California Artists Radio Theatre (C.A.R.T.), under the direction of Peggy Webber, which is still currently heard on National Public Radio. Many of her performances helped win numerous awards for the ensemble cast.

Long before Montana became a haven for the Hollywood elite, the McIntires brought a backwoods cabin there in 1937. She returned to her Montana home every year since that time. So it is most fitting her last movie role was as Robert Redford's mother in "The Horse Whisperer," filmed in Montana in 1997.

There will be a private burial in Montana and a public memorial service for later in the summer is pending.

She was preceded in death by her husband, John; son, actor Tim McIntire; and brother, Phillip Nolan.

She is survived by her daughter, Holly Wright and grandson, Luke Wright, of Charlottesville, Va.; and sister, Miriam Walker of Ashland, Ore.
