





1998 Lyle John Rutherford, 82

Montana ski pioneer, veteran railroader and consummate spinner of yarns, Lyle John Rutherford, 82, of Whitefish died Nov. 10 at St. Patrick's Hospital in Missoula.

He was born on April 23, 1916, in Braham, Minn., to Glen O. and Charlotte Rutherford. The family moved to Bowdoin, near Malta, in 1917, and his father and grandfather worked building railroad grades with horse drawn equipment. The family homesteaded near Content, and he spent his early years in a sod house.

The family moved to Whitefish in 1926, and cleared stump land on Karrow Ave. where they lived until the late 1950s. He went through school in Whitefish. He acquired a love for the outdoors and hunting while logging with his father during the Depres-

He was active in the Lutheran church and was the oldest charter member of the Christ Lutheran Church at the time of his death.

He was one of the last surviving Big Mountain ski pioneers, and helped build the first ski cabin. Along with Chuck Creon and Jim Rolette, he was instrumental in installing the first rope-tow on the

In 1937, he and Ole Dalen moved onto the ski hill and were the caretakers of the cabins. He was also active in the first ski patrol and was president of the Whitefish Lake Ski Club in 1949, when the national races were held on Big Mountain. He was honored as the oldest surviving ski pioneer at Big Mountain's 50th Anniversary last winter.

He signed on with the Great Northern Railroad in 1940, but his career was interrupted by World War II. He served in the Army Engineer Corps until the end of the war and was on Omaha Beach on D-Day.

He returned to the railroad after the war and worked until his retirement in 1978. When he retired he was

number one conductor on the Kalispell Division. He loved working with people on the passenger trains, and his old conductor's uniform hangs in the museum at the Stumptown Historical Society.
"It was a Great Ride," he often said

of his railroad career.

He was a charter member of the Whitefish Rifle and Pistol Club. He belonged to the Moose Lodge, VFW Post 276, and supported the Stumptown Historical Society.

He was an active life member of the Flathead County Sheriff Posse. In 1989 he joined the Flathead Buffalo Runners and enjoyed shooting black powder competition dressed in tradi-

tional mountain man garb.

He loved to palaver with his pals in the local coffee shops and his special brand of folksy repartee will be

remembered by his friends.

He was married in 1946, to Verona Rendler who preceded him in death in 1971. In 1972 he married Laura Hinck, a Havre native who survives in the family home. He is also survived by sisters Katherine Schwenke of Edmonds, Wash., Helen and husband, Craig Milton, of El Cajon. Calif., and Charlotte and husband, Tom Sloan, of Marysville, Wash.: and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was honored to be an "extra grandfather" to Joshua and Jesse King of Whitefish who brought much

joy to his life.
