Whitefish couple marks 75 years

Margaret "Peg" Swanson recalls it was on a blind date that she first met Eskil "Skull" Swanson, now her husband of nearly 75 years. But the date wasn't with Skull.

When the blind date fizzled, a couple introduced her to two guys working on a motorcycle. She started dating one of them but that wasn't Skull, either.

"I dated his friend for a couple of weeks but then we broke up," Peg said.

Finally, she got together with the man with the Henderson motorcycle. Though the bike burned holes in her silk stockings, Peg didn't mind traveling on two wheels. "I rode that motorcycle as long as he had it," she said.

The Henderson was considered one of the finest in the world at the time. Skull finally gave up the bike when his best friend lost a leg in an motorcycle accident.

Sitting today in their cozy living room at Riverside Senior Living, the Whitefish couple recalled their lengthy courtship on the West Coast.

It was 1928 in San Diego, Calif. Both Skull, 18, and Peg, 15, were transplants from Chicago. They spent three years dating because Skull insisted on waiting until he was 21 to marry.

"It wasn't like today where you live together five to 10 years," Peg said.

On Skull's 21st birthday, his aunt cooked a special dinner for the couple and placed a set of engagement rings on the table. Before the evening was out, June 13, 1931, was set for their wedding.

On the appointed day, the couple put on their finest clothes and said their vows at Skull's sister's house in Carlsbad, Calif.

"We got married under that arch," Peg said, pointing out the landmark spot in front of the dining room memorialized in a fading black-and-white photo.

Just a few friends and Skull's aunt attended the ceremony. Finances kept the bride's parents from making the drive.

"It was The Depression days and dad was out of work," she said.

In spite of dire economic conditions, Skull managed to build a double-car garage into a house for his new bride. His

best friend painted the kitchen the day they got married.

After the ceremony, the couple drove off in their black Model A Ford with "Just Married ... Hot Dog!" scrawled across the back.

Skull supported his bride with his body-work skills which he learned working from age 14 at his uncle's shop in San Diego. He also worked as a plumber.

They spent 24 years in LaMesa, Calif., until a road project sent them packing for Montana.

"A freeway took our home," she said.

The two were ready for a change after a tide of humanity flooded into San Diego during the war and afterward. Losing their home gave Peg

an opening to convince Skull he would love Montana's fishing and hunting more than California's.

She had been enthralled with the Flathead Valley since age 13 when her family traveled through Montana on their move to California in 1925. In 1955, she got her wish to live in Whitefish.

Skull had a job waiting at Rygg Ford. Two years later, he opened Skull's Body Shop just across from the police station in what is now the parking lot of American Bank.

"Things have changed in Whitefish," Peg said.

While Skull doctored cars, Peg kept the books and raised the last two of their four children: Judy Phillips, now of Whitefish and Lee Swanson, now of Sacramento.

The older children, Bonnie Howerton of El Cajon, Calif. and Darlene Gauthier of Teno, Idaho, were already married and on their own when the couple moved to Montana.

Skull retired and sold the business in 1975 when he was 65. He and Peg spent many happy years hunting and fishing and traveling before and after retirement. They also were avid bowlers and gardeners until age slowed them down.

"Skull's 96 and I'll be 94 on my birthday June 26," Peg said.

The couple lived in Happy Valley for 31 years, where Skull maintained the water system well into his 90s. Then
