**Drowned in Ashley Creek**

Sylvian Deere the little 2½ years old boy of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Deere was drowned in Ashley creek, Tuesday morning.

It seems the little fellow followed two dogs which belong to Mr. H. Stauss who lives at the Hetzer place. Some people saw him following the dogs.

A few minutes after his disappearance the father and some neighbors began a search; soon they discovered his foot prints leading towards the creek. At the creek they found where he had gone on the ice, saw where he broke through and had got out, then broke through again and got out, then broke through again and was drowned.

The search lasted about two hours. Dr. Morrow was sent for but owing to the fact that the child had been dead for more than two hours no attempt to resuscitate was made.

**Laid to Rest**

Never in the history of the town has there been a larger funeral in Kalispell, or one in which there was more universal sympathy shown for the afflicted than was that of Joseph Goshorn and Glen Jaqueth which was held from the Methodist church last Sunday afternoon. The building was crowded and there were more on the outside than were within. The caskets were covered with floral offerings, and that of Glen was wrapped in the American flag, he being a member of Company H, a detachment of which organization followed a body to the grave and fired a salute, after which "taps" was played by the bugler.

The services at the church were conducted by Rev. Spire and Rev. Fisher, both Presbyterians, of which church the boys were members. Rev. Fisher preached the funeral sermon in a most impressive and affecting manner. He was often overcome by his emotions in his address and compelled to pause to control his feelings.

Beautiful music was furnished by a male quartet consisting of Andrew Dunsire, Axel Rydlander, Arthur Johnson and Bruce Young, who sang "Lead Kindly Light," "Nearer My God, to Thee," and closed the services with "Bear Them Home."

The bodies, followed by an immense procession, were taken to Conrad Memorial Cemetery and there laid to rest.

The floral offerings from sympathizing friends were profuse and appropriate, large numbers of set pieces and designs coming from Kalispell people in far-away Seattle and from Spokane.

#### Drowned in Stillwater.

A man named Gus Lundmoe was drowned in the Stillwater river at a point about eighteen miles north of the city on the 19th of April. He and a man named Hansen were going to a place where men were breaking out logs in search of a job at the time the accident occurred. Hansen went across the river on a log telling his companion to remain where he was as he was not a river man and the water was high and dangerous. Just at the time Hansen landed on the other side he heard some one yell twice, but could see no one on the river. He and the men went to where Lundmoe had been and found his tracks leading down to the water to where he had evidently stepped on a log in an attempt to cross. Since then nothing has been seen of him and it is supposed he attempted to cross on a log and was drowned. The sheriff and his deputy went out last Friday and again on Sunday and dynamited the river in an attempt to raise the body, but so far their efforts have been unavailing.

#### Funeral of Edith Vogt.

In the silent hush of sorrow the faculty and students of the University of Washington assembled in Denny Hall Saturday afternoon to join with the family and friends around the bier of Edith Vogt in extending to her the last sad tribute of loving respect. The simple but sincere and impressive services of the Protestant Episcopal Church were conducted by Rev. J. P. D. Lloyd, assisted by Rev. H. Clement King.

The flowers, the music, the prayers, the sympathetic message from Scripture and passage were all as gentle as they could be, but the silent tears in the eyes of her classmates spoke in the universal language of the severed ties.

Classmates had prepared Denny Hall for the occasion. The stage presented one huge bank of evergreens and ferns, flecked with the blooms of dogwood. A fence of sword ferns at the edge of the platform bore a large bouquet of bridal wreath at its center and the dias on which the casket rested was com-

pletely carpeted with ferns. Flowers were brought in bundles and armfuls, the junior class sending a dainty pillow of lilies-of-the-valley.

A quartette of university students, Lila Martin, Mrs. G. W. Osborn, H. L. Filer and Hart Willis—sang "Abide With Me" and "Nearer My God to Thee," and George Phillips, an old Montana friend of the family, sang a beautiful baritone solo that told of hope beyond.

The bearers were chosen from among her friends and classmates. Besides there was a group of honorary bearers, all her most intimate friends of the junior class, who wore their loved junior hats, the same kind that Edith wore the day her young life was so suddenly ended. The girls bore large bouquets which they lovingly placed by the side of their dead friend.

As the pastor closed his tribute, he turned to the audience and said: "In bringing this service to a close I wish to speak a message from the bereaved family. They feel that the sympathy and untiring labor and helpfulness of the faculty and students of the university have placed their family under a debt of gratitude they can never repay."

The attendance at the obsequies was fully 500, mostly students of the university.—Seattle Times.
