CROMWELL IS KILLED
A brief but thrilling telephone message from Somers, to the sheriff this morning, conveyed the news of the slaughter of Clarence Cromwell, presumably at the Dayton creek ranch, by his brother-in-law, Frank Masterson.
Whether related in the message or not, the particulars as rumored are that last night Frank Masterson was dragged out of his bed by Clarence Cromwell and threatened with a revolver, Masterson closed with Cromwell took his gun away and either beat or shot him to death. Rumor further states that the quarrel between the two men was the culmination of domestic strife, Masterson having naturally espoused the cause of his sister, Mrs. Cromwell, who, it has been stated on more or less good authority, lived unhappily with her husband. Clarence Cromwell lived near Dayton, ranging cattle on the Flathead Indian reservation and also raised horses. Frank Masterson had a ranch in the neighborhood and was engaged in similar business and some suggestion has been made that his trouble with Cromwell was on account of business disagreements. It is said Masterson gave himself up, claiming self-defense. Judge Dempsey of Dayton brought the news to Somers from where it was telephoned. Sheriff O'Connell will leave this afternoon for Dayton and the inquest will probably be held by the local justice of the peace. Clarence Cromwell had a brother of considerable wealth living in Canada, who has been notified.

LITTLE BOY DROWNED

Fell From Tree Top Into a Deep Pool
of the Stillwater.

Two little fellows, Chas. Read and Joe Fracas went swimming in the Whitefish, near the railroad bridge last Saturday, and Joe, the older of the two boys, was brought back a corpse. As told by the little Read boy, seven years old, Joe who was 11, fell from a tree above the pool in which they had been bathing and despite such assistance as the sole witness could give, was drowned. The Read boy ran to the railroad track, where a section crew were working and got some of them to help get the drowned boy out, while others went to town and notified the authorities. Coroner Sherman lost no time in recovering the body which he brought to the morgue Saturday night.

The drowned boy was a son of Mrs. Joe Fracas, an Austrian, who was deserted here several years ago by her husband and has been supporting herself and children with some assistance from the county. She was very much grieved over the death of the boy who was getting old enough and big enough to assist her in the life conflict.

The Fracas family and the Read family both live in Duncan addition and much alarm was caused in the Read family by a report that their little boy had been drowned, the section men making a mistake in the names. Further color was given by the fact that the youngster did not return home until after dark, when he was received with embraces, tears and upbraidings.

According to the little boy's account, Joe had been in bathing and climbed the tree to get a bird's nest. The pool was directly under the tree and a sort of pot hole, 6 or 8 feet deep. The Read boy said he tried to help Joe out with a rope or a pole, but the lad evidently could not swim nor help himself.

The lad was buried yesterday evening in Demersville cemetery.

Scared by a Slight Accident to Freight Car, Hobbo Jumps and Is Killed By Car Following.

A boxcar tourist named Fred Hopkins, was killed in the mountains yesterday afternoon at about 2:30. Locomotive No. 1842, Engineer J. W. Davis, was bringing a freight train down from Summit, when a flange on one of the car wheels broke, derailing several cars of coal and tearing up the track several rods. Hopkins was riding in the boxcar which carried the bum wheel. He jumped when he felt the car leaving the track, and was caught by the car following, which reared up and crushed him as it left the track. Victor Swanson was a pard of Hopkins, but did not jump when called to, and was uninjured. Two other hoboes were rescued from the coal and demolition cars, only slightly scratched up. The Engineer stopped the train in a few car-lengths, but sufficient damage was done the roadbed to delay traffic several hours, the east-bound passenger reaching here at 2:30 a. m. The man killed had been working as a farm hand on Blackfeet reservation for the past two months and was beating his way west.

The remains were picked up in a basket by Coroner Sherman and brot to Kalispell for burial. No inquest was deemed necessary.

KILLED AT THE
NORTHWESTERN

Carl Johnson, a Transfer Man, Is the Victim of a Peculiar Accident.

Monday afternoon at the Northwestern sawmill, just east of Kallispell, Carl Johnson, a transfer man, was accidentally killed. There were several men standing around the sawmill waiting for some material to be cut and Johnson was leaning on a log. To get out of the way of a log which was just being started along the tram from the sawmill, he attempted to swing around his car and get on the other side. Either the car tipped from the sudden lurch the man gave as he swung around the side, clinging to it, or else he lost his balance and to get himself clutched at the car dragging it with him. He fell a distance of about six feet, the car, weighing several hundred pounds, falling on top of him and crushing in his chest. He was never conscious from the time he was struck, dying in a very few minutes. One man and a boy witnessed the accident, and when Mr. Jones, who was at the sawmill, reached the spot a few minutes later, the poor fellow was at his wits' end.

Carl Johnson was a Dane, about 27 years of age, and had been in this country but a short time, having no relatives in America. He worked at the Northwestern a short time last fall and has been around there and in the woods during most of the winter. The sudden fall and the simple injuries which caused his death is
