Man Killed at Lasalle.
Anton Gunderson, who had 40 acres near Lasalle, was struck by a train Thursday night and killed. He was about 29 years of age, and leaves a wife and child. Gunderson was a passenger on the train leaving Kalispell at 9:35 that night and was killed by the returning train, near his home. He is thought to have been under the influence of liquor, and was struck while sitting on the track.
