The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Clarence Kopp, who gave a scripture reading, and by Rev. Joseph Chester, who gave a brief sermon. Mr. Chester said in part:

"The news of this death came to the community as a great shock and occasioned feelings of profound regret. We expect the old to die but the death of a strong man in his prime, apparently enjoying the very best of health until within the last few weeks, intensifies the grief beyond the power of words to express.

"We speak of his death as untimely. He was in the midst of his great life's work. Before him were plans for greater knowledge in his special field in order that he might be of still greater service to afflicted humanity.

"Many comments have been made upon the life of Dr. Bogardus by all classes of people, not only as a physician but as a man, a big brother, a splendid citizen. His special training did not remove him from the great masses nor chill the springs of human sympathy toward all. 'There was a real man,' is the comment often heard within the last few days. Those who were privileged to know him more intimately found in him a man of exceptional Christian character. His deeds of charity through the work of his profession reflect something of the spirit of him who said, 'I came not to be ministered unto, but to minister.'

"Dr. Bogardus will live in the hearts of all who have known him and his influence will outlive the limitations of mortal flesh.

"The many expressions of sympathy and the presence of many friends from neighboring communities is indeed a tribute to his life and character. Your presence here, not without effort, is in itself not only one of the greatest tributes but is a source of consolation to the bereaved who more keenly feel this great separation.

"We thank God today" for the privilege which has been ours of knowing Dr. Bogardus through the months and years. We are profoundly thankful for the fellowship with him; it has been ours to enjoy. We thank God for his many deeds of kindness and his ministry of service. We thank God for that manly man, the conscientious sympathetic physician, the splendid citizen and Christian gentleman.

"We mourn not his death but rejoice in the larger life given to him through our hope of immortality. His life has not ended, it is only in its beginnings. He having been faithful over a few things is made ruler over many things."

Although of a quiet and retiring disposition Dr. Bogardus has made a host of friends in Kalispell, and the greatest sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Bogardus and her little son in their bereavement.

Funeral services for Miss Harriet Braun were held Saturday at 2 p. m. at the Waggener & Campbell chapel, Rev. Chester officiating.

Miss Braun was born at Fort Bliss. Texas. June 30, 1894. Her father, Nicholas L. Braun, lost his life in the Spanish-American War and at this time the family moved to Union City. Pa. Here Miss Braun secured her schooling.

Upon the opening of the Flathead reservation for settlement the family came to Montana and later Miss Braun began her training for nursing—a profession which she had planned for herself since she had been a very young girl. She nursed at the Whitefish hospital for two years and then secured a position in the Lamar, Colo., hospital. Later she nursed at other hospitals near Denver.

Her illness was of very short duration. According to messages received from the Littleton, Colo., hospital where Miss Braun was last employed, she had assisted with an emergency operation Friday night. Shortly afterward she became very ill and the doctor pronounced her trouble to be a stone in the right kidney. Early Saturday morning she became unconsicous. The doctors then held a consultation and decided that urenic poisoning had set in. The doctors and nurses worked with her but she did not respond although she was given oxygen almost continually. for several hours. Death came peacefully at 4:30 p. m. Sunday,

Miss Braun's outstanding characteristics were her optimisbtic nature, her kindness and generosity. Appreciation of these qualities was expressed in the tributes to her memory sent in messages and flowers by her friends in Colorado and in this locality.

The deceased is survived by her mother, Mrs. Martha Braun of Swan Lake, her sisters, Mrs. Frank Bosworth of Swan Lake and Mrs. Peter Myre of Somers, and her brother, James Braun of Spokane.
