

## ELEVEN YEAR OLD BOY LOSES LIFE IN AWFUL ACCIDENT

Harold Odegaard, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. K. Odegaard, who live east of the river, 12 miles from KallsPELL, was killed in a frightful accident just before noon today. The lad had been driving a mower in the hayfield, and in some unknown way fell in front of the machine, or the horses ran away and threw him forward on the pitman rod.

H. O. Nelson, who was working in a nearby field, noticed that the team was not in the place where it would naturally have been, and that there was no one on the driver's seat. He hurried over to investigate, and found that the boy had been dragged to death, and his body badly mangled. There were a number of severe scalp wounds and numerous fractures.

Coroner Campbell was summoned, and the body was brought to the Waggener & Campbell chapel. No funeral arrangements have been made.

The funeral of Harold Odegaard took place Friday afternoon. The comforting words of Rev. Bates, the beautiful flowers and the selections of the male quartet, and the large number of friends from over the valley brought comfort to the parents' heart. In the hours of their bereavement. The little fellow was laid to rest in the Conrad memorial cemetery. They have the sympathy of many people throughout the valley.

## HARRY OSBORN DEAD; EPILEPSY THE CAUSE.

Harry Osborn, a printer, who at one time was publisher of The Browning Review, died of epilepsy this morning at 3 o'clock at the county hospital.

He has been in KallsPELL for several months, and seemed to be in rather straightened circumstances. About a month ago he worked for a few days in the Inter Lake composing room, at which time he said that he was having a difficult time to secure work on account of ill health.

He roomed at The Savoy, and yesterday Mrs. Downey, the proprietor, suspected that something was wrong when he did not get up. About 4 o'clock she called Chief of Polic Adams, who effected an entrance, and found Osborn lying on the floor frothing at the mouth. Thinking that possibly he had attempted suicide, Dr. Dodge was called, and the unfortunate man was removed to the county hospital. His case was diagnosed as epilepsy.
