CAPTAIN HODGE DIES IN HIS BUNK ON THE STEAMER "KLONDYKE"

Polson, Mont., July 31.—Captain Eugene Hodge who plied the waters of Flathead Lake, largest inland body of fresh water west of the Great Lakes, for 44 years, died yesterday in his bunk on the steamer "Klondyke" as it was moored at the Polson docks.

The captain was 75 years of age and was one of the oldest and best known early-day settlers in the Flathead region having visited its port of call year after year during the summer season.

**FORMER FLATHEAD MAN
DROWNED IN IDAHO**

Jack Hartwell, former resident of Flathead county, who left here two years ago, was drowned recently while working on a log boom in Coeur d'Alene lake, Idaho.

Friends here have received the following account of his death:

When he fell into shallow water of Coeur d'Alene lake while handling Ohio Match logs at the S. & I. loading dock, Jack Hartwell, 46, employe of the Lafferty Transportation company, met death by drowning.

Body of Hartwell was recovered from four feet of water soon after but use of a city fire department inhalator and artificial respiration applied by firemen, county officers, fellow workmen and volunteers failed to revive him.

Frank Roe, unloading contractor for the Lafferty company, together with Ernest Roe and Hartwell, were unloading the logs from an Ohio Match train on the quarter-mile long trestle dock when the logs became jammed in shallow water. Hartwell was lowered down by a rope to the log boom. He removed the rope about his arms, and with a pike pole, released the log jam.

While the last logs were separating, Hartwell in some manner unknown, slipped and fell off a log into the lake. His body sank to the lake bottom with neither of the Roes hearing any cries for help. A few minutes later one of the Roe brothers noticed Hartwell had disappeared and called to him. Receiving no answer, he looked around and saw Hartwell was on the lake bottom. The Roe brothers then lowered themselves by a rope to the boom of logs and Ernest dove down and recovered the body, perhaps five minutes after the drowning.

Hartwell's body was placed on a flat car where officers and others worked an hour and 20 minutes without success trying to restore breathing. Oxygen was also supplied. On either side of Hartwell's face were bruises, indicating he might have fallen across a log and been stunned.
