**FORMER KALISPELL  
BLACKSMITH DIES AT  
BILLINGS HOSPITAL**

Livingston, Aug. 11.—Known only as Harry Jones, an itinerant, dependent upon the government for what little help he could get, a man who died in a Billings hospital last night from typhoid probably the result of eating refuse in a city dump, has been identified as a former Kalispell blacksmith.

According to case records in the hands of federal transient officials here, the dead man, "number 668," is 60 years of age, and operated his shop in the northwestern Montana city from 1906 to 1926.

He also formerly lived at Donnelly, Minn., and has a daughter, Ethel Jones now residing at Owatonna, Minn. A sister, Grace Jones, lives in Los Angeles.

Jones, it was learned here, was found early in the week in a very emaciated condition, eating what he could find at the Billings city dump. He was seriously ill at that time.

The man, local relief workers said, was a resident for some time of the "jungles" in Livingston.
