**ALEX SHALL IS KILLED AT CORAM;
EARL GRAVELLE TAKEN IN CUSTODY**

MEN HAD BEEN LIVING TOGETHER IN CABIN — GRAVELLE TELLS CONFLICTING STORIES OF SHOOTING. CORONER'S JURY RECOMMENDS THAT HE BE HELD FOR TRIAL FOR MURDER

Earl "Blackie" Gravelle, who has been living at Coram for several months, was taken in custody by Sheriff McMillan this morning, following a coroner's inquest, at which the jury recommended that he be held for the murder of Alex Shall, who was shot through the head in Gravelle's cabin some time early this morning.

The first that was known of the tragedy was between 5 and 6 o'clock this morning when Gravelle appeared at the homes of some of the residents of Coram and told them that a man was dead at his shack. Some he told that "a man was dead, but he had shot himself," but Mrs. Arvilla Calkins testified Gravelle said he had killed a man. George Diller testified that he had heard a shot about 2:30 this morning.

The news of the shooting was telephoned to Kalispell, and Coroner Campbell, Sheriff McMillan, Deputy Korb, and County Attorney King arrived at Coram about 7 o'clock. After an investigation by officers a jury was empaneled, and an inquest held in the Fehilberg Service station.

Officers say Gravelle and Shall had been living together in a shack about 300 yards west of the depot at Coram. Both men had been working in the woods for F. S. Calkins, and had been drinking heavily for the last three days, officers were informed.

Gravelle first told Coroner Campbell that a stranger came to the shack early this morning, drank with them, and then picked up the rifle, asked if it was loaded, and shot himself. He appeared to be badly confused, and later said Shall and the stranger were struggling for possession of the gun, and that Shall was accidentally shot in the scuffle. He said while the struggle went on he sat on a stool and watched it without interfering. At first he said he didn't know the stranger, but later said the man had lived with him for three weeks, but he knew him only by the name of "Pete," and that he had left after the shooting.

Several said that the man known as "Pete" left about a week ago and hadn't been seen about Coram since.

Shall was shot through the eye, and the entire back of his head blown away. The body lay where it had fallen when the officers arrived, but Gravelle had removed the gun to another room. Coroner Campbell says there were no powder marks to indicate the shot had been fired at close range. Sheriff McMillan found a fully loaded revolver about 15 feet from the cabin, but the owner was not discovered. Gravelle said Shall had always carried

a revolver, but none was found on the person of the dead man. There were signs of a struggle in the cabin and the empty shell from the rifle was found in a water bucket.

Shall has relatives in Michigan, who have been notified of his death. Gravelle, it is said, was at one time a resident of Butte, where he had a family, but has been away a long time. He has been about Coram for the past five months.

County Attorney King today is preparing to file information direct in district court charging Gravelle with murder.

**ALEX SHALL'S BODY
IS BEING SHIPPED

The body of Alex Shall, who was killed at Coram Monday, is being shipped by Coroner Campbell today to Munising, Michigan, where his mother and a sister reside. Another sister lives in Pontiac, Michigan.

County officials are of the opinion that Shall was murdered, and an inquest has been held charging Earl "Blackie" Gravelle with the crime.

GEORGE STANFORD DEAD

George F. Stanford, one of the pioneer residents of the Flathead valley, was found dead at his home near the Hoosier ranch on the west shore of Flathead lake this morning.

He was last seen alive day before yesterday, but Coroner Campbell believes that death occurred this morning, as he had lighted a fire and the stove was still warm when the body was found. He was discovered about 10:30 by a neighbor who had been in the habit of dropping in to see him frequently. He had been in poor health for a long time, but the immediate cause of death has not been determined.

Mr. Stanford was a brother of Harry P. Stanford of this city, and of Mrs. Alicia D. Conrad, whose death occurred some years ago.

He was an expert mechanic, and was engaged in business here when he first came to Kalispell, but has been living on the lake shore for the past 30 years.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

Helena, Feb. 7.—Funeral services were held yesterday at St. Mary church for Joseph Sullivan, 26, police Sixth ward resident, who died February 3, shortly after he had shot himself with a .22 rifle he had started to clean. Burial was in Resurrection cemetery.

Joseph Sullivan was born in Marysville in 1906. He had passed his life in this section of the state and had a wide circle of friends who mourn his sudden death. He was employed at a Helena service station for 10 years. On the evening of his death he attended service and confession at St. Mary's church and then visited his father, Patrick J. Sullivan. The two men had planned to go on a hike and rabbit-hunting trip the next morning, and the younger had picked up the rifle to clean it when the accident took place. The father was in an adjoining room when the gun was discharged, and found his son fatally wounded. Death occurred soon afterward.

Surviving, besides the father are a brother, John R. Sullivan of Helena, and seven sisters, residents of other states.
