BODY OF BONNEY ROOT NOT YET DISCOVERED

The sherin's office reported today that the body of Bonney Roat, who drowned in the Sillwater river below the Northwestern dain white swimming Sanday, has not been recovered. Dragging operations which continued and dark last night have been discontinued and a water will be kept until the body raises to the surface.

BONNEY ROOT IS DROWNED IN RIVER NEAR N. W. DAM

Bonvey Root, son of Mr. and Mrai B. F. Root, was droward yesterday afternoon while swimming in the Stillwater river just below the Northwestern dam.

Those who witnessed the drawning say he dove off a springboard on the dam, but evidently get into a whirt-pool and was mable to swim out. He came to the surface and called for help and Dale Gorleck and another boy whose name was nell-learned, swam out and get held of him by the strap of his swimming said and got him very nearly to shore, when the strap broke, and he disappeared. They are of the opinion that he was unconsiders at the time, and mable to help himself further.

The shoriffs force and a large number of volunteers worked, antil dark, but were unable to discover the body, and were continuing their efforts this morning, assisted by two divers from Belton, who have been beneath the aron of the dam, and into all the deep electes without mecass. A large number of boys who

were swimming at the dam formed a shain across a riffle line below, where the water is only about three teel deep, and are positive the body did not go down stream. Sheriff McMillan, who re-built the apronisone years ugo, says there is a network of pilling and cross thes andermeth, and is of the optiman that the body may have lodged there.

The tamily formerly lived near LaSalte, but recently moved to the Corton place near the Northwestern dam. Mr. Root says his son left the house about 1:30, and the accident occurred soon afterward. He was: 21 years of age and an excellent switching.

Another tragedy nearly occurred this morning, when a gate broke as an effort was being made to lower it, and a man working below was nearly crushed in the wrockage of timbers. Also a small boy, whose name was not learned, fell into the dam, went under a gate and came out below. He could swim like a fish and said he knew all he had to do was keen his head.

The dam is a very dangerous place to swim, especially during high warer, on account of the many currents and whirlpools, and many lives have been lost there in the past 25 years,
