### BODY OF BONNEY ROOT NOT YET DISCOVERED

The sheriff's office reported today that the body of Bonney Root, who drowned in the Stillwater river below the Northwestern dam while swimming Sunday, has not been recovered. Dragging operations which continued until dark last night have been discontinued and a watch will be kept until the body rises to the surface.

## BONNEY ROOT IS DROWNED IN RIVER NEAR N. W. DAM

Bonney Root, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. P. Root, was drowned yesterday afternoon while swimming in the Stillwater river just below the Northwestern dam.

Those who witnessed the drowning say he dove off a springboard on the dam, but evidently got into a whirlpool and was unable to swim out. He came to the surface and called for help and Dale Corlock and another boy whose name was not learned, swam out and got hold of him by the strap of his swimming suit and got him very nearly to shore, when the strap broke, and he disappeared. They are of the opinion that he was unconscious at the time, and unable to help himself further.

The sheriff's force and a large number of volunteers worked until dark, but were unable to discover the body, and were continuing their efforts this morning, assisted by two divers from Helton, who have been beneath the apron of the dam, and into all the deep eddies without success. A large number of boys who

were swimming at the dam formed a chain across a riffle just below, where the water is only about three feet deep, and are positive the body did not go down stream. Sheriff McMillan, who re-built the apron some years ago, says there is a network of piling and cross-ties underneath, and is of the opinion that the body may have lodged there.

The family formerly lived near LaSalle, but recently moved to the Gorton place near the Northwestern dam. Mr. Root says his son left the house about 1:30, and the accident occurred soon afterward. He was 21 years of age and an excellent swimmer.

Another tragedy nearly occurred this morning, when a gate broke as an effort was being made to lower it, and a man working below was nearly crushed in the wyckage of timbers. Also a small boy, whose name was not learned, fell into the dam, went under a gate and came out below. He could swim like a fish and said he knew all he had to do was keep his head.

The dam is a very dangerous place to swim, especially during high water, on account of the many currents and whirlpools, and many lives have been lost there in the past 25 years.
